Hold On – With God-like Patience – Everything will be alright

Fr Mark writes ...

The last nine months have seemed like a very long time indeed for so many of us who have been experiencing the effects of the global pandemic. So much has changed and there is so much pain that has been experienced, so much weariness that has accumulated and, in spite of it all, so many blessings that have been offered.

Over these next few weeks, though, I want us to take a step back and view things from a different, broader perspective. What would our centuries-old Cathedral here in Winchester make of all this; what insights might St. Catherine's Hill offer if she were able to cry out; what wisdom could the planets and stars contribute in these days...And, most importantly, what does God have to say on the subject.

For 13.77 billion years, give or take 40 million years or so, God the Almighty, Creator of all that is, visible and invisible, planned to send Jesus, his only Son, born of the Virgin Mary, as Emmanuel, God-with-us. Throughout all that time, creation was yearning, the angels were waiting, humanity was holding on until God's plan to save Creation was revealed. From Adam and Eve's fall, through the building of arks and the crossing of deserts, the building and destruction of Temples and exiles in foreign lands, God was preparing his people until, in the fullness of time, he sent his only Son to bind the human family to himself with a new bond of love so tight that it can never be undone.

In Jesus, our Salvation is revealed, the Victory is won, Light has conquered darkness. And yet, we still find ourselves in the midst of battle, living in an imperfect world, holding on until Jesus returns in his glory. What are we to do in this 'in between time'? ***We are to hold on - hold on to Jesus our Saviour, keep close to him, our Good Shepherd, who leads us through The Valley of Darkness, knowing that if he is with us then all things will be well, everything will be alright.***

Advent is a season of expectant, hope-filled waiting, of holding on. We know that something is not quite right. The world isn't as it should be (we can see this in our community; our parish; our family; even our own soul) and yet God is present, mysteriously so, waiting to reveal His face. God is up to something very special that we cannot yet see clearly.

After a year of challenges, changes, suffering, isolation, social distancing and blessings, perhaps there's never been a more important time to ask for the gift of Hope as we reflect on the Incarnation; on God's incredible plan to draw as close as possible to us, by becoming one of us. ***In this season, let us "hold on", waiting with patient and eager, hope-filled longing. Let us "hold on" tightly to Jesus Christ and our faith; let us also hold on to each other in love.*** Let us trust that God is with us and will reveal His face to us once more. ***Let us believe in God who alone is capable of making everything alright.***

Last week, I reflected on our understanding of God as a loving Father, who is still shaping us and forming us into the image of his Son Jesus, as a potter gently moulds clay at the wheel. We're not perfect yet and we can't make ourselves perfect; we need God's help.

This week, I'd like to consider *how* God continues to shape us and I'd like to emphasize that ***God forms us with immeasurable patience.*** St. Peter wrote:

There is one thing, my friends, that you must never forget: that with the Lord, 'a day' can mean a thousand years, and a thousand years is like a day.

With the Lord, with our Heavenly Father, there's a whole different perspective on time. I remember when I was a child that time would often go so slowly when I was waiting for something: for dad to come

home from work, for the next meal to arrive magically on the table, for my birthday. As a proportion of my lifespan, a month was a pretty long time in those early years. For God, "sat on the mountain-top, watching us wander along the path of time which stretches out below", the vantage point is very different.

St. Peter continues:

The Lord is not being slow to carry out his promises, as anybody else might be called slow; but he is being patient with you all.

Those of you who are parents often impress me. You are just so incredibly patient. I'm sure that a grouch like me could never have as much patience as you do. Even when you think you're being impatient, you're much better at it than me! Maybe it's one of those gifts that turns up alongside your first-born in the package delivered by the kindly stork. Or maybe it's something that's learnt through blood, sweat and tears. Or maybe, and this seems most likely, it's because you love your child so much that you are willing to wait patiently whilst they struggle, make mistakes, push back, learn and grow. You have some idea of where they're heading, even if they cannot see that for themselves.

If that's the case, then imagine how much more patience the God of infinite love has for you, and for me. And thank God, as we mess up and wander down the wrong path and get things wrong time and time again, through a combination of resistance, ignorance, foolishness and sin. Thank God indeed that our Father is in no rush with us or I would have failed that exam countless times.

"God is being patient with you all, wanting nobody to be lost and everybody to be brought to change his ways."

Our Father has no intention of giving up on us. He keeps holding on.

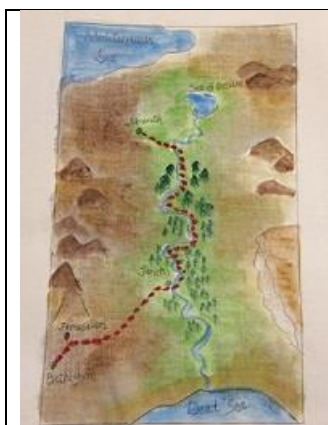
Are we able to learn something of that patience for ourselves? Can I discover how to be patient with God, as he continues to shape and form me, painfully at times? Even if I cannot see clearly yet what he's up to?

Can I learn to be patient with:

- ✘ my sibling, who winds me up more than anyone I know?
- ✘ my belligerent boss or complaining colleague or selfish staff member?
- ✘ my nosey neighbour or forgetful friend or imperfect parish?

Can I discover how to be patient with myself and those around me, knowing that none of us is the finished product?

Can I keep holding on, patiently, through tears of immense joy and intense pain, to the God who so patiently and lovingly waits and longs for me? – **Fr Mark**

Advent and Christmas

We really want this to be a Christmas to Remember for all the right reasons. We want it to be a time when the central message of Christmas – that God-is-with-us and so everything will be alright – is able to penetrate our hearts and minds in a new and deeper way. And we'd love to share our Christmas this year with you and your family, friends, neighbours and loved ones.

Christmas Masses

At the heart of everything we do is prayer and that beautiful opportunity to listen to and speak with God, and at the heart of our Catholic prayer is the celebration of the Mass. This is our opportunity to connect with God and to connect with each other through our physical and spiritual communion.

As with so much else, things are going to be a little different this year. So, for example:

We will be offering some public masses where people can join with us physically and be in one of our beautiful churches with each other; and we will be offering masses online for people to join in from their homes.

For those coming to one of our public masses, you will need to book in advance, either on our website – www.catholicwinchester.org.uk – or by phone – 01962 852804. (Some Christmas Masses are already full; some are not yet open for booking whilst we confirm we have enough volunteers to keep everyone safe) For those of you joining us from home, no booking required!

For those in church we're planning to have some beautiful Christmas music, even if you cannot join in with the singing. For those at home, the music will be just as beautiful and you can sing to your hearts content.

For those in church, you will be able to receive Holy Communion or a blessing in person; for those at home, you will be able to make a spiritual communion and receive many spiritual blessings.

For those of you with young families, our 4pm Mass on Christmas Eve at St. Stephen's and our 6pm Livestream Mass will be especially for you.

Because space will be limited at our masses on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, we want to encourage those of you who cannot join us in person then to come and be with us for Mass on another day in the Christmas Octave*.

We will be giving all those who book for mass on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day the opportunity to "give up their seat for a guest". This would be a wonderful gesture of hospitality to any visitors who turn up without a ticket. You will be offered this option when you book your place.

*Christmas Octave

Although the 'obligation' to attend Mass on Sundays and Holydays of Obligation will remain suspended for the time being, we know that many individuals and families will want to go to Mass, particularly at Christmas. We want to see how we can accommodate as many as possible of those who desire to go to a Christmas Mass.

Like Easter, the Nativity of the Lord is one of the two solemnities in the Ordinary Form of the Church's liturgical calendar which has its own Octave. The Church regards each day in an Octave as if it were the solemnity itself. So, for example, the prayers for Mass and the Liturgy of the Hours during the Christmas Octave refer to each day as if it were still Christmas Day. Despite having days within the Octave that are feasts: St Stephen, St John the Evangelist, the Holy Innocents and the Holy Family, and the concluding Solemnity of Mary the Mother of God, each of these days is as the Roman Missal states, a "day within the Octave of the Nativity of the Lord." This means that, liturgically, each of the days from 25th December to the 1st January is 'Christmas Day'. I would like to encourage you, therefore, to know that you can come and celebrate the mystery of the Octave days. This will allow you to plan for a day within the Octave when you would like to come to our churches to celebrate their Christmas Mass this year. Christmas at any of the Masses during the Octave days. Little Ways of Making a Big Difference this Advent... a very important message

We really do have an opportunity to make this year a very special one if we all find something, even a very little something, that we are willing to give of ourselves.

The first and most important thing to ask from you all is your prayers. Please pray that this Christmas we are able to feel a true sense of connection and meaning: connection with families who we may not be able to be with this year, connected as a parish despite the restrictions on being able to celebrate in unison as we usually would, and connected to God. And that this sense of connection will continue to bear fruit into the coming months.

If you feel you may have a little time to spare to help out in the run up to, or over, Christmas there are a multitude of ways you can. Primarily we need to ensure that we are able to hold as many public masses as possible so that everyone who wishes to can attend. In order to do so safely we need welcomers to help with the smooth running of the services and making sure the church is ready to be used again. This would only require a couple of hours of your time and could be done by anyone planning on attending one of our masses. It's very simple and you will be given some basic guidance on what it involves.

If you might have a little more time then we have a few whole-parish projects we hope to be hosting: maybe you're a budding artist or set designer for our outdoor crib and star trail? Perhaps you're a tech wizard who could help with collating and editing a video montage? Or you're a great photographer and can take pictures to add to the video? Or a wannabe influencer who could share some great content on our parish Facebook or Instagram (themes each week – send a photo)? Or just maybe you're the generous type and would like to get involved with one of our giving activities or something more practical? And for people who find themselves at home a lot more at present but would still like to do something, we also need people to write Christmas cards or be part of a team in one of our virtual tea rooms. Take your pick!

Please have a think as to whether there is anything you feel you may have to offer our community this year and if you would like more information - or perhaps you already know exactly what it is you would love to help with. 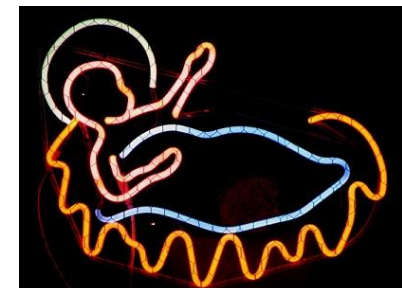

A Call to Adoration - 'Come to the One who knows you best'

We cannot encounter God and remain unchanged however subtle the encounter.

Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament (Adoration) will take place in St Peter's Church when open for private prayer. Below are some ways these times of prayer could be used.

- **Adoration & Contemplation.** Come as you are. Relax into the reality that God loves you. Speak to Him as if you were speaking to a close friend. Listen, watch, wait.
- **Intercession.** As we come before Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, what better place to intercede? For our families and friends, Church and government, health organisations and key workers, the lost and suffering, the end of the pandemic, those seeking God, etc.
- **Reflecting on Scripture.** The gospel for Sunday or another bible passage that is familiar to you. How is God speaking to you through His word?
- **Lighting a candle.** Jesus Christ is the Light of the World, our hope and salvation. In whose life or in which situation, would you like to bring the light of Christ?
- **Prayer Journaling.** Keeping a diary of the mix that is your personal and spiritual life and 'charting' that journey. What might God be saying or doing in your life at a particular time? Sometimes, it is only when we look back that we see that God was always there.
