Hold On to What is Good, Hold On to Christ – Everything will be alright

Fr Mark writes ...

Over the last nine months or so, we have been experiencing the effects of the global pandemic. So much has changed and there is so much pain that has been experienced, so much weariness that has accumulated and, in spite of it all, so many blessings that have been offered.

In the context of the history of the cosmos, however, nine months is not so long. For about 13.77 billion years, God the Almighty, Creator of all that is, visible and invisible, planned to send Jesus, his only Son, born of the Virgin Mary, as Emmanuel, God-with-us. Throughout all that time, creation was yearning, the angels were waiting, humanity was holding on until God's plan to save Creation was revealed. From before the moment when Adam and Eve took the first bite of the forbidden fruit, God was preparing his people until, in the fullness of time, he sent his only Son to bind the human family to himself with a new bond of love so tight that it can never be undone.

In Jesus, our Salvation is revealed, the Victory is won, Light has conquered darkness. And yet, we know that many things are not quite right. The world isn't as it should be (we can see this in our community; our parish; our family; even our own soul) and yet God is present, mysteriously so, waiting to reveal His face. God is up to something very special that we cannot yet see clearly.

Advent is a season of expectant, hope-filled waiting, of holding on. We are invited to hold on - hold on to Jesus our Saviour, keep close to him, our Good Shepherd, who leads us through The Valley of Darkness, knowing that if he is with us then all things will be well, everything will be alright.

Two weeks ago, I reflected on our understanding of God as a loving Father, who is still shaping us and forming us into the image of his Son Jesus, as a potter gently moulds clay at the wheel. We're not perfect yet and we can't make ourselves perfect; we need God's help. Last week, I considered how God continues to shape us with immeasurable patience.

This week, I'd like us to think about how holding on to Jesus can bring us immense joy, in good times and in bad. St. Paul says,

"Rejoice always; pray unceasingly; give thanks in everything."

It's a simple enough formula to express but a more challenging one to live out.

I'd like to focus today, this "Gaudete Sunday", on "rejoicing always", on "joy". It's a theme to which Pope Francis often returns and one which has been prominent in his teachings, for example "Evangelii Gaudium" (The Joy of the Gospel) and "Amoris Laetitia" (The Joy of Love). He writes:

"The great danger in today's world, pervaded as it is by consumerism, is the desolation and anguish born of a complacent yet covetous heart, the feverish pursuit of frivolous pleasures, and a blunted conscience. Whenever our interior life becomes caught up in its own interests and concerns, there is no longer room for others, no place for the poor. God's voice is no longer heard, the quiet joy of his love is no longer felt, and the desire to do good fades. This is a very real danger for believers too. Many fall prey to it, and end up resentful, angry and listless. That is no way to live a dignified and fulfilled life; it is not God's will for us, nor is it the life in the Spirit which has its source in the heart of the risen Christ." (Evangelii Gaudium, 2)

This is a beautiful place to begin an examination of conscience in this season of Advent, as we prepare for a very different Christmas.

Is my heart complacent yet covetous? In other words, do I take time to care for my heart, to feed it and nourish it with healthy, life-giving food? Do I allow it to receive and experience true and pure, unconditional, freely given love? Do I exercise my heart, allowing it to grow and expand, to share love with others? Do I pay attention to what is going on in my heart, to those hopes and joys, fears and desires and learn to sift what is love-giving from that which is destructive, that which leads me towards God from that which leads me away from God? Do I have an excessive desire for what belongs to others, for wealth or possessions? Do I spend my time comparing myself with others, leading me to feel insecure? Is Christmas a time to numb the pain and restlessness I'm experiencing, or a time to open my heart up to new opportunities for gratitude and generosity?

Do I engage in the feverish pursuit of frivolous pleasures? In other words, do I try to hop frenetically from one iceberg of temporary satisfaction to another, looking for the next buzz or kick or thrill? Is Christmas all about the next mince pie or glass of mulled wine and how many gifts I find under the tree? Or is there a deeper, longer lasting joy to be found?

Do I have a blunted conscience? In other words, do I find it difficult to discern the difference between right and wrong? Am I able to make practical judgements of reason which enjoin me to do good and avoid evil? Am I able to recognise the voice of God, the gentle whisper or the strong command, or the urgent encouragement of the One who has loved me into existence? What softly spoken word or message does God have for me and my loved ones this Christmas?

Have I become angry, resentful or listless? Or am I living a life in the Spirit which has its source in the heart of the risen Christ? In other words, when I am thirsting for joy do I drink from the deep well of Christ's love for me, or do I look in some other place?

"The joy of the gospel fills the hearts and lives of all who encounter Jesus. Those who accept his offer of salvation are set free from sin, sorrow, inner emptiness and loneliness. With Christ joy is constantly born anew." (Evangelii Gaudium, 1)

What more beautiful message might we want to hear this Christmas than that, allowing it to sink into the depth of our being? Jesus was born into this messy, mucky world to look for you and to set you free from sin, sorrow, inner emptiness and loneliness. He will never force you but he won't give up on you either until you say 'yes' and allow him and the joy he brings to be born anew in you.

St. Paul urges us further: hold onto what is good and avoid every form of evil. Hold on to Christ, who alone is good. Hold on to him with a loving embrace or hold on by the hem of his cloak. Whatever you do, hold on tight.

That is why God came to dwell among us - so that we have not just some *thing* but some *one* to hold onto, someone who can lead us out of the deepest pit to the heights of heaven; someone who can carry us across the most barren deserts and through the fiercest of storms; someone who has both the power and the desire to soothe our aching souls, mend our broken hearts and heal our wounded bodies.

Hold on to what is good; hold on to Jesus Christ - your lasting Hope and your eternal Joy - and everything will be alright.



Advent and Christmas

We really want this to be a Christmas to Remember for all the right reasons. We want it to be a time when the central message of Christmas – that God-iswith-us and so everything will be alright – is able to penetrate our hearts and minds in a new and deeper way. And we'd love to share our Christmas this year with you and your family, friends, neighbours and loved ones.

Christmas Masses

At the heart of everything we do is prayer and that beautiful opportunity to listen to and speak with God, and at the heart of our Catholic prayer is the celebration of the Mass. This is our opportunity to connect with God and to connect with each other through our physical and spiritual communion. As with so much else, things are going to be a little different this year. So, for example:

We will be offering some public masses where people can join with us physically and be in one of our beautiful churches with each other; and we will be offering masses online for people to join in from their homes.

Many of our public masses are already fully booked – a few tickets may become available again if people change their arrangements – the best way to check is on our homepage www.catholicwinchester.org.uk which always has the latest details.

But ALL masses from St Peter's will be livestreamed, so make the most of it if that is your choice – you can share the joy and you can join in with the music, singing as loudly as you can! There are going to be suggested special ways for children to join in with – look out in next week's newsletter for ideas and activities, and some things you might like to collect together before mass. The livestream will be as special as we can make it. We especially recommend the two "Livestream only masses", both on Christmas Eve - 6pm (especially for families) and midnight mass. And please remember that you can come for Mass on another day in the Christmas Octave*. Enjoy Christmas Day mass at home, then come in peace another day....

*Christmas Octave

Although the 'obligation' to attend Mass on Sundays and Holydays of Obligation will remain suspended for the time being, we know that many individuals and families will want to go to Mass, particularly at Christmas. We want to see how we can accommodate as many as possible of those who desire to go to a Christmas Mass.

Like Easter, the Nativity of the Lord is one of the two solemnities in the Ordinary Form of the Church's liturgical calendar which has its own Octave. The Church regards each day in an Octave as if it were the solemnity itself. So, for example, the prayers for Mass and the Liturgy of the Hours during the Christmas Octave refer to each day as if it were still Christmas Day. Despite having days within the Octave that are feasts: St Stephen, St John the Evangelist, the Holy Innocents and the Holy Family, and the concluding Solemnity of Mary the Mother of God, each of these days is as the Roman Missal states, a "day within the Octave of the Nativity of the Lord." This means that, liturgically, each of the days from 25th December to the 1st January is 'Christmas Day'. I would like to encourage you, therefore, to know that you can come and celebrate the mystery of the Octave days. This will allow you to plan for a day within the Octave when you would like to come to our churches to celebrate their Christmas Mass this year. Christmas at any of the Masses during the Octave days. 


These are our Parish Christmas cards! A Christmas message for your friends and family.

Blue Christmas: Monday 21st December, 10:30am at St Peter's Church

For many people there are split emotions as Christmas approaches. Some of us feel keenly the pain of loss, bereavement, separation, hurt or regrets. Others feel alienated by the manifest materialism and secularisation of the season: more than ever, this is a time of material difficulty for many, in a world where so many lack the basics of food, shelter, peace and justice. And there are few who have not been impacted by the spread of the Covid-19 virus, causing illness, isolation and death. As a result, many of us find Christmas a difficult time to celebrate, and worry that - especially this year we have to bury our feelings to make everyone else happy. Blue Christmas is a short service to enable us to recognise these more painful parts of our lives and of our world, not to cheer each other up or wallow in pity, but to offer God the whole of who we are. Mark 1:3


They then heard about the baptism of Jesus by John the Baptist and the children thought about the following questions...

A Call to Adoration - 'Come to the One who knows you best'

We cannot encounter God and remain unchanged however subtle the encounter.

Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament (Adoration) will take place in St Peter's Church when open for private prayer. Below are some ways these times of prayer could be used.

- Adoration & Contemplation. Come as you are. Relax into the reality that God loves you. Speak to Him as if you were speaking to a close friend. Listen, watch, wait.
- <u>Intercession.</u> As we come before Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, what better place to intercede? For our families and friends, Church and government, health organisations and key workers, the lost and suffering, the end of the pandemic, those seeking God, etc.
- Reflecting on Scripture. The gospel for Sunday or another bible passage that is familiar to you. How is God speaking to you through His word?
- <u>Lighting a candle</u>. Jesus Christ is the Light of the World, our hope and salvation. In whose life or in which situation, would you like to bring the light of Christ?
- <u>Prayer Journaling</u>. Keeping a diary of the mix that is your personal and spiritual life and 'charting' that journey. What might God be saying or doing in your life at a particular time? Sometimes, it is only when we look back that we see that God was always there.

Know that we cannot encounter God and remain unchanged however subtle the encounter. The Church will be open for private prayer with Adoration at the following times (this week):

8am – 9am, Monday to Friday

11am – 12noon, every day except Sunday, when 11-11.45 because of the 12 noon mass
