Pivotal Moments III – Stop, Look, Listen

Fr Mark writes

I am talking over these few weeks about “Pivotal Moments”.

Two people can attend the same event and walk out of it with completely different opinions about the experience and what happened to them. Their minds and memories have become fixed on different moments.

Moments matter because they come to stand for so much of how we view the world. Moments matter because they form a kind of lens through which we understand ourselves, our world, our place in the world, our relationships, our relationship with God.

Moments matter, and some moments matter more. God uses Pivotal Moments in your life to reveal his connection to you, his purpose and plan for your life and to encourage you to grow in trust for him.

The Prophet Samuel

Today we’re looking at a Pivotal Moment of one of the heroes from the Bible and how it applies to us. We are looking at a Pivotal Moment early in the life of the prophet Samuel. And the moment he experienced is one I believe God wants to give to each and every one of you.

Samuel lived in a period of crisis and transition, 1100 years before Christ. There was a great leadership vacuum that was felt throughout the people. Samuel stepped into that vacuum and he helped guide the nation through the transition from a tribal culture to a united kingdom, eventually under the leadership of Israel’s greatest leader, King David.

The passage we are looking at today is the Pivotal Moment that launched Samuel into his great and historic role, a moment long before he knew fame and influence. Samuel grew up working for the priest Eli, who was sort of the high priest at the time, kind of the spiritual leader of the nation. Eli was not a bad man but he was a weak one, and lazy too. His poor leadership began with his own family, with sons abusing their power in much the same way we’ve seen played out over the course of history.

One day Eli was asleep in his usual place. His eyes had lately grown so weak that he could not see.

Again, Scripture subtly tells us of Eli’s poor leadership. His physical blindness and weakness are symbolic of a much deeper blindness and weakness. There was no vision for the nation because Eli could not see what was going on or what was ahead. He was so weak he could not see where God was the leading the nation or what God wanted to do.

Three times in the night, God calls out to Samuel but each time Samuel fails to recognise this as the voice of the Lord and thinks it is Eli calling him. Each time, Eli tells him to go back to sleep. Eventually, after the third time, Eli finally gets what’s going on. At this point he gives Samuel a little piece of advice, a piece of spiritual advice that changes his life forever.

And do you know what? This advice could possibly change your life too. That’s what happened to Samuel. This advice is incredibly, ridiculously simple. It is so simple that you might be tempted to dismiss it out of hand. But don’t. Most spiritual practices are ordinary and simple, but powerful because they access the power of God. This one is no exception.

Eli tells Samuel to wait for the Lord to call him, and when he does, Samuel is to say, *“Speak, Lord, your servant is listening.”*

That’s it. When you have the impression or feeling that God is trying to get your attention and speaking to you, respond to God and say,

“Speak, Lord, your servant is listening.”

It’s pretty simple advice, and the moment Samuel starts following it, everything changes.

Scripture tells us that God then reveals to Samuel that there is going to be a change of leadership in Israel, that Eli will be out and Samuel will be in. God reveals to Samuel his vision and plan for his life, what he’s planning on doing through him.

Samuel grew up and the Lord was with him and let no word of his fall to the ground.

Samuel learned to tune into God so well that when he spoke God’s words hit the mark and were always effective. Because Samuel was effectively listening to the Lord, he was speaking more effectively to everyone else.

The Christian life can contain moments of incredible impact and significance, power and grace. But it doesn’t begin there. Bold deeds and historic achievements are instead the fruit of simple obedience and the humility to listen.

It is as simple as listening to the voice of God, being available to him, listening to him.

To hear God speak we have to listen. How do we do that?

- ✘ We listen by establishing a daily quiet time, even if only 5 or 6 minutes a day. Make it the same time and place every day and you’re more likely to stick with it. You can do it at home or in your car or walking your dog.
- ✘ We listen by listening to others. Not every word spoken by someone else will come from God, but the Lord will often use other people as instruments to get our attention. If someone says something to you that hits a spot - maybe a ‘sweet spot’ that brings joy or consolation or peace or maybe a ‘raw spot’ that causes pain - then bring it to the Lord and ask if he’s trying to say something to you through that word.

(By the way, as a Church we also need to get better at listening - to God and to his people, to know the hopes and fears, the joys and troubles of God’s children and to be aware of God’s response. Bishop Philip is currently conducting a survey so that we as a diocese can become more aware of where we are and where God is calling us. It will take about 10-20 minutes to complete and you can access it by clicking this link - www.surveymonkey.com/r/2XRKQDS We will be conducting a shorter - 2 or 3 minute - survey here in the parish in a few weeks’ time to “take the pulse” of our congregation and see what God might be saying to us)

- ✘ We listen by seeking periods of silence in our days, away from technology and noise and the clutter of our culture.
- ✘ We listen to God by reading God’s word, by spending time in Scripture, inviting God to speak to us through the words of the Bible.

Admittedly, God sometimes uses choirs of angels and stars rising in the East. Sometimes the heavens will be torn apart and there will be a voice from heaven. Maybe one day God will hire a pilot and skywrite a message to you. But more often God will use quiet Moments and silence to communicate.

Your relationship with God will change from the Moment that you recognise that God wants to communicate with you, that he has basic and practical

<p>advice he can share with you on a daily basis, to help you, to lead you, to guide you, to comfort you, to challenge you, to inspire you, to love you. Until you have that Moment, your relationship with God will be stunted. God will remain a category, a class, an obligation, an idea, an insurance policy, but nothing more...of no real practical, daily help.</p> <p>Samuel's life changed and he began an incredibly significant and successful life, a life of historic impact, when he said, simply,</p> <p><i>"Speak Lord, your servant is listening."</i></p> <p>It's that simple.</p>	<p>God wants to speak to you, but you have to believe he wants to speak to you. And you have to believe that so much, that you are willing to invest time in it.</p> <p><i>"Speak Lord, your servant is listening."</i></p> <p>Pray it every day.</p> <p>It could be your Pivotal Moment.</p>

We want everyone to stay safe and take due care: we – all of us - have been given a responsibility by being allowed to continue going to church so it's important that we observe the social distancing regulations. We've had a trust placed in us, and we must respect that – that's the only way we can keep our churches open.

If you can still come to church safely, please do so, bearing in mind safe behaviour at all times – it's particularly important that you keep your distance from those in the congregation from other households, and don't socialise or stop and chat with them at the end of Mass, either inside or outside church. Please: wave, nod, smile and greet from a distance. We know how hard that is, none of us likes it, but we have to observe the rules in the hope of a better future...

And remember that **all services from St Peter's are livestreamed** so you can always take part from home.

Message from St. Peter's School

Dear Parents

Baptism of our Lord

Our Gospel assembly this week focused on the words of Matthew as the children heard about the baptism of our Lord.

As soon as Jesus was baptized, he went up out of the water. At that moment heaven was opened, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting on him. And a voice from heaven said, "This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased."
Matthew (3:16-17)

We reflected on the presence of the three persons of God within this scripture and the revelation of Jesus as Son of God.

This links with our RE, where the children are learning how God reveals Himself in scripture and in our everyday lives through the topic 'Revelation'. The youngest will learn this through some of the parables that Jesus told us, as well as learning about some of his miracles.

Lower KS2 will be thinking about how Jesus is revealed at Mass, as well as the importance of light as a symbolism of revelation. Meanwhile, the oldest children will be thinking about the role of baptism in revealing God and learn about the importance of the Pope and Bishops and the role they play in revealing Jesus to us today.

Holocaust Memorial Day 2021: Be the Light in the Darkness

Each migrant and refugee is a human being These were

the words of Bishop Paul McAleenan in his homily on the World Day of Migrants and Refugees. Pope Francis called us to recognise Christ in every displaced person. The 'tragic fate of the displaced and refugees', like that of Jesus' parents fleeing with him into Egypt, is 'marked by fear, uncertainty and unease'. <https://www.cbcew.org.uk/home/events/previous-events/days-of-prayer/world-day-of-migrants-refugees-2020/popes-message-wdmr2020/> At a local level, our parish strongly supports the work of the Southampton and Winchester Visitors Group, SWVG, in befriending and assisting refugees and people seeking asylum.

As has recently been reported in the press, the government is now planning to build a camp for people seeking asylum on Ministry of Defence land at Barton Stacey. There is indeed an urgent need for accommodation for people seeking asylum, exacerbated by the huge backlog that has built up in the asylum system during the pandemic, but along with Caroline Nokes M.P. and local councillors, SWVG is very concerned about this proposal, which would see 500 young men housed in portacabin-style blocks next to a village with a population of 1000, seven miles from the nearest town. As Chris Stephens, chair of SWVG wrote in a letter to the Hampshire Chronicle, <https://www.hampshirechronicle.co.uk/news/18969527.letter-asylum-seeker-camp-proposed-barton-stacey-wrong-place/>, people who have fled conflict, torture or imprisonment need to be able to access medical and mental health facilities, libraries and English classes as well as legal support. The proposed site is completely unsuitable. If you would like to object to the scheme and support the right of vulnerable people to suitable accommodation and support, please write to your M.P. as soon as possible.
