FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT – Year B

God's Covenant (and our Connectedness) with All

Fr Mark writes: In our first reading this weekend, we hear part of the tale of Noah and the ark. God spoke with Noah and made a covenant, an agreement, a bond with him. Not just with him, however, nor even with just Noah and his family or Noah and his descendants. God makes this covenant with every living thing. Some commentators have named this the “cosmic covenant”, the promise that God makes to Creation as a whole.

In the book of Genesis we have a rising crescendo of primal sin, and of alienation from God. From the creation of Eve/woman as the pinnacle of creation, humanity begins to slide rapidly, beginning with the temptation in the garden, to the sin of envy and the first murder, and a progressive degrading of the harmony and beauty which once existed. We are only in the sixth chapter of the Bible, when God decides to send the flood to wash away all the sin and filth of the world. All that will remain is one man, Noah, and his family, along with the animals which will be rescued on the ark.

God knows that mankind is going to mess up, that evil will occur, and yet this does not stop God from creating. Creation is part of God's salvific plan, a blessing for us. We are bodily creatures and our salvation presupposes Creation.

What sort of relationship do we have to Creation?

We cannot be independent of Creation, for our bodies are made of it. Nor are we to instrumentalise Creation, treating it merely as a resource to be plundered and exploited. I would like to suggest that our call, our vocation, is to *participate in* Creation. We are part of Creation and cannot exist, or be saved, apart from Creation. The Incarnation presupposes creation. God doesn't leave behind materiality, finiteness but rather transforms it. The Resurrection of Jesus, and our future resurrection, is a bodily one, albeit with a new body. We need, therefore, to think in new way from the perspective of resurrection. Creation, in God's plan, is not ordered to decay but towards transformation in Christ.

In [Laudato Si](#), Pope Francis speaks of Creation as a sick sister, crying out for mercy, for love which heals. The crisis is personalised and each of us is called to a conversion - to see and respond to the needs of our sister from our own heart. We are being called into a deeper “*koinonia*”, or communion, with Creation and with Creator, whose image is “stamped” on all created things in their relationships.

If the rising crescendo of primal sin is about the breaking of relationships, then the work of the Holy Spirit is in restoring and bringing healing to these relationships, to this living connectedness.

God wants to bring healing to Creation. God wants to bring health – biological as well as spiritual and psychological. We are called as Christians to recognise that we have a unique relationship with Creation, a moral relationship, one that goes beyond respect to teleology: “I want this Creation to flourish so that it too may achieve its goal.” We are to be instruments of healing for Creation but also to allow Creation to be a source of grace, and therefore healing, for us.

Wendell Berry, in the poem *The Peace of Wild Things*, writes beautifully of this healing grace:

*When despair for the world grows in me
and I wake in the night at the least sound
in fear of what my life and my children's lives may be,
I go and lie down where the wood drake
rests in his beauty on the water, and the great heron feeds.*

*I come into the peace of wild things
who do not tax their lives with forethought
of grief. I come into the presence of still water.
And I feel above me the day-blind stars
waiting with their light. For a time
I rest in the grace of the world, and am free.*

Let me end by sharing some possible “ecological virtues”, which might serve us well as we invite the Holy Spirit to help us undergo our own ecological conversion this Lent.

Praise – “[St.] Francis helps us to see that an integral ecology calls for openness to categories which transcend the language of mathematics and biology, and take us to the heart of what it is to be human. Just as happens when we fall in love with someone, whenever he would gaze at the sun, the moon or the smallest of animals, he burst into song, drawing all other creatures into his praise. He communed with all creation, even preaching to the flowers, inviting them “to praise the Lord, just as if they were endowed with reason”. (Laudato Si, 11) you only praise someone if you value them.

Gratitude – “One expression of this attitude is when we stop and give thanks to God before and after meals. I ask all believers to return to this beautiful and meaningful custom. That moment of blessing, however brief, reminds us of our dependence on God for life; it strengthens our feeling of gratitude for the gifts of creation; it acknowledges those who by their labours provide us with these goods; and it reaffirms our solidarity with those in greatest need.” (Laudato Si, 227) Gratitude towards another helps us to recognise and treat the other as a gift and not as something to be exploited.

Justice – “our inability to think seriously about future generations is linked to our inability to broaden the scope of our present interests and to give consideration to those who remain excluded from development. Let us not only keep the poor of the future in mind, but also today's poor, whose life on this earth is brief and who cannot keep on waiting. Hence, “in addition to a fairer sense of intergenerational solidarity there is also an urgent moral need for a renewed sense of intragenerational solidarity” (Laudato Si, 162) What systems are required and what personal decisions to ensure that Creation is genuinely for the benefit of all?

Sobriety and Simplicity – “Christian spirituality proposes an alternative understanding of the quality of life, and encourages a prophetic and contemplative lifestyle, one capable of deep enjoyment free of the obsession with consumption... It is the conviction that “less is more”. A constant flood of new consumer goods can baffle the heart and prevent us from cherishing each thing and each moment. To be serenely present to each reality, however small it may be, opens us to much greater horizons of understanding and personal fulfilment. Christian spirituality proposes a growth marked by moderation and the capacity to be happy with little. It is a return to that simplicity which allows us to stop and appreciate the small things, to be grateful for the opportunities which life affords us, to be spiritually detached from what we possess, and not to succumb to sadness for what we lack. This implies avoiding the dynamic of dominion and the mere accumulation of pleasures. Such sobriety, when lived freely and consciously, is liberating” (Laudato Si 222-3) What can we do to guard against hoarding and so allowing ourselves to enjoy the “small things” of life?

Humility – “Once we lose our humility, and become enthralled with the possibility of limitless mastery over everything, we inevitably end up harming society and the environment.” (Laudato Si, 224) How do we ensure we are “earthed”?

Maybe this week you can reflect on these ecological virtues and bring to prayer the question, “Lord, which of these do you most need me to cultivate this Lent?”

Learn about why the Church, since the earliest times, has recommended the three 'pillars' of Lenten devotion: prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Develop your understanding of prayer and fasting and share practical ideas for Lenten observance.

Called to Serve Tuesday 2 March 19:45 – 21:00 Listen to how the third 'pillar' of Lent, almsgiving, is a call to service. Deepen your understanding of prayer as the source of love, and service of our neighbour as a consequence of love.

The Stations of the Cross is a 14-step devotion commemorating Jesus Christ's last day on Earth as a man. Each station focuses on a specific event of His last day, with meditation and prayers. It can be done individually when the church is open, and there will also be a guided service on Sundays in Lent at 4.30, starting this weekend – at St Peter's church, and also livestreamed. The service lasts around 40 minutes.

Current lockdown regulations



CWL NEWS "Another first achieved; we had our CWL Portsmouth Diocese AGM and for the first time, it took place on Zoom, which we are well used to now. It's really great how we've all taken to the technology and most importantly, it is easier to keep in touch, not available that long ago but making such a difference to each and everyone involved now. Then last Thursday evening at our CWL Zoom meeting, we were talking about candles, members showed special ones to them. Following on, we reminisced about pilgrimage, firstly to Lourdes, and discussed how Lourdes has changed over the years but people's great ardour has never waned. Some have been to the Holy Land with Canon Paul, visiting Nazareth, the Sea of Galilee, the River Jordan, Bethlehem and Sr. Maria Grech at the Bethlehem Centre where she and her team do such sterling work for those partitioned - for whom we've raised funds several times - and Jerusalem including the Via Dolorosa, Mass in the Church of the Holy Sepulchre and the Garden of Gethsemane. Having visited all these places mentioned in the Bible, it became so much more meaningful when hearing readings at Mass back home. One member had been to Lisieux and still has a special feeling remembering. Also went to Mass in the Church - famous because of the

parachutist caught on the roof - and the Museum behind the Church at St. Mére Église in Normandy. Visiting Lisieux was memorable, arriving in a thick mist, then almost magically the Basilica of Lisieux appeared out of the mist, an almost spiritual moment. It was just beautiful there inside the Basilica, the place, the history and the atmosphere. At the time of Thérèse's exhumation, a palm cross discovered inside her coffin was found to be green. Thérèse's Parent's grave is at the rear of the Basilica; also visited was the Carmelite Convent where Thérèse lived and was first buried, later transferred to a Chapel which now holds her body in a Reliquary in Lisieux. What special memories we carry with us that enrich "our journey."
