This week we have celebrated the Feast of the Ascension. In the Bible, we can find plenty of examples where God tells someone, "GO". For example, he told Abraham to GO and he told Moses to GO and he told Jonah to GO. But God can instruct us in a number of ways, and here his instruction is to stay and wait. So if you're trying to discern God's will for your life, it's useful to know that God doesn't ever only tell people to GO. Your instruction might be to stay, or wait, or something else entirely. Jesus tells his apostles to stay and wait for the Holy Spirit to come. That's what we're doing with our Pentecost Novena. We're asking the Holy Spirit to come and then we're waiting, expectantly, for whatever God wishes to give us.

And this is the perfect conclusion to this series because it not only sends us out into the world to love the people around us but it also sets us up for the next series, beginning next Sunday, which is all about our neighbourhoods. The pope's choice of theme for the 2021 World Communications celebration, which is this weekend, is drawn from Jesus' invitation to St. Philip in the Gospel of John.

"Come and see," is an invitation "central to the Gospel" and to the ongoing proclamation of the Christian faith, a proclamation that is not just about words, but is "made up of looks, testimonies, experiences, encounters, closeness. In a word, life."

In the call of the first disciples, with Jesus who went to encounter them and to invite them to follow him, we also see the invitation to use all media, in all their forms, to reach people as they are and

Even when physical proximity is impossible, Catholic communicators can use media to reach out to people, help them experience the closeness of the church and invite them to follow Jesus more closely. The second collection today will help to fund the communications department at the Bishop's Conference nationally so that they can enable this most important work to happen. Thy Kingdom Come - Novena to the Holy Spirit

The Great Feast of Pentecost will soon be upon us, when we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit given to Mary and the Apostles, and so also to the early Church. After Ascension, those first disciples were told by Jesus not to leave Jerusalem but to wait there "for what the Lord had promised" (Acts 1:4). We too, then, are invited to "wait for what the Lord has promised us", namely the Holy Spirit. Please would you consider offering a Novena to the Holy Spirit from Friday 14th May to Saturday 22nd May for a new outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon us as individuals, upon our parish, our diocese and upon Winchester and the surrounding towns and villages. On Friday 14th May, and Monday 17th – Friday 21st May, we will include the Novena prayer as part of morning prayer and adoration. It will also be included as part of the morning mass on Saturday 15th and Saturday 22nd May and during Night Prayer on Sunday 16th May. This gives us the wonderful opportunity to pray the Novena together, either in person or online.

Thy Kingdom Come is a global prayer movement, which invites Christians around the world to pray during this same period for more people to come to know Jesus Christ. As Catholics, we can support this initiative with our Pentecost Novena, Prayer of the Faithful and an encouragement for us to pray, as we normally do, with the particular intention for our loved ones to come to faith in Jesus Christ. Re-opening of the Pastoral Centre(s) and other Church Facilities

As a team within the Pastoral Centre, we too have been extremely cautious and frustrated as to what we have been able to do and allow over the last 15 months. The increased uncertainty and what might be possible has been difficult in trying to second guess what and when we might be able to do something. At this time, we are working towards re-opening access the Pastoral Centre(s) from Monday 6 September 2021. We are working through a number of maintenance activities in advance of being able to re-open. Pre-lockdown, the Pastoral Centre was largely closed for the month of August, so given the uncertainty about the easing of lockdown at the end of June, it seems sensible for us to delay re-opening the centre for an extra few weeks. That means, we hope, that we will be able to re-open fully and safely in September, and offer the date with some confidence. Over the last few weeks, we have granted permission to a limited number of users to meet in the Pastoral Centre under very strict conditions; these have and will continue to be judged on their individual merit. We sincerely hope that you will continue to bear with us whilst we move forward to welcoming everyone back. In the meantime, if you believe that you have a valid reason to be granted access, please contact me direct via gdailly@portsmouthdiocese.org.uk and we will consider your request. LOCKDOWN REPORTS – STEWARDING

Who are the unsung heroes of the church in lockdown? **The stewards!** They are the people who make sure that the church is clean and safe, that track and trace is in place, that everyone knows exactly what they are doing. They stand in the narthex in the freezing cold, being friendly and welcoming, and helping everyone – from those who whisk past with a quick confident flash of their phone to capture the QR code, to those who aren't sure about the techonology, or the masks, but just really really want to come to Mass or Adoration.

The stewards sort everyone out to receive communion, guide everyone out of the church. And then afterwards they do the cleaning. (Though using the fogging machine is fun, so could come under the heading of a reward rather than an extra burden.) They deal with people's understandable frustrations with patience and charm, they take the time to be nice to everyone, and they guard your details with care.

After the first lockdown, we all realized that we could only re-open the church in good conscience if it was as safe as humanly possible to attend, and we adhered strictly to the rules. When we were - unexpectedly - allowed to stay open in the second lockdown, the responsibility and the trust became even greater. Our organizers and stewards stepped up and did that for us.

There have been around 34 volunteers, and there has been public mass and Adoration in St Peter's every single day since the church re-opened, along with Sunday masses and other services at the other three churches - all needing stewarding . All the volunteers are doing what they can with one simple aim: to make sure everybody who wants to can attend in
