THE MOST HOLY TRINITY – Year B

Next Door II - Trinity Sunday

Fr Mark writes:

We are in the second week of our series we are calling Next Door: The Art of Neighbouring. The premise of this series is that God wants you to be a channel of his goodness and grace in your neighbourhood. If you are a follower of Christ, the Holy Spirit is sending you to be an instrument of his goodness and grace to the people who live near you. Throughout the course of this series we are going to work to change our thinking and take some initial steps towards allowing God to use us in our neighbourhood. Jesus commands us to love our neighbour. And whenever we follow what Jesus says there are always blessings to be found. Last week, we started with a simple step, which each and every one of us can take. We were encouraged to pray for our neighbours and our neighbourhood. We looked at the challenge of praying for the neighbourhood as a whole. Praying for neighbours we know, and those we don't. Praying for God's grace and blessing upon the people who live there. Today we are going to suggest another very simple step that is a little more challenging. But it is a very simple way we can work with God for his purposes in our neighbourhoods.

We are looking at a passage from the very end of Matthew's Gospel. On Easter Sunday, Jesus rises from the dead. Then, for forty days Jesus appears to the apostles (as well as hundreds and hundreds of other disciples). In his last appearance, before he ascended into heaven, Jesus gathered the eleven remaining apostles. He said to them,

"Go...make disciples of all nations." (Matthew 28:18)

Jesus came to renew and restore creation by bringing people into a growing relationship with him, by making disciples. This is why the Universal Church exists. It exists to renew and restore creation by bringing people closer to Jesus, into a growing relationship with Christ. And while there is a universal call to renew and restore all of creation, our own responsibility is more parochial: to make that work as specific as possible. God wants to use us for the transformation of the world to build his kingdom. And the transformation of the world happens person by person, family by family, door by door, neighbourhood by neighbourhood. Jesus continues:

"Baptise them in the name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, and teach them to observe all the commands I gave you." (Matthew 28:18-19)

Today is Trinity Sunday and we are reminded of a core truth of our faith: God is not alone. God is a communion of three persons: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. This means that God, in his essence, is relational. God is Love Loving.

We too are created for communion, fellowship. This is true for every area of our lives. We are made to live in connection with others.

- ✘ You might like the work you do but if you don't have a connection to the people you work with, you are less likely to like your job.
- ✘ You might enjoy sports, but you probably enjoy them a whole lot more when you're in the company of people who enjoy them as much as you do.
- ✘ It is why for those of you who are parents, when your son or daughter moves to a new school or they are going away to uni, one of the things you worry about the most is whether or not they will make friends or the right friends. You know intuitively that if they don't find some kind of community they are more likely to find life harder.

It is not good for us to be alone because God created us not to be alone. It is not good for us to try and meet all our own needs on our own because that is impossible. We are not created that way. Independence and self-sufficiency are fine things to strive for and maintain but there are limits to them. Self-centeredness that becomes self-absorption creates psychological alienation. Nothing makes us more miserable than self-absorption. In your neighbourhood, there are likely to be some very lonely people.

The truth of the Trinity tells us that we cannot be fulfilled or content by pursuing a life cut off from others. God has created you to be connected with others. And, wherever or whoever you are, God offers an opportunity for connection.

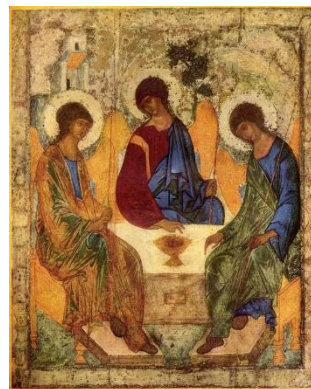
So there are two truths we see in the Gospel this weekend:

The first truth is that God gives us a mission to be change agents to restore the world to how God intended it to be.

The second truth is that God gives us a mission to be undertaken in our community.

So what does that mean practically? How do we restore our communities? Where to begin? Let's look again at the passage from Mathew.

When Jesus passes on his authority to the apostles and establishes the core purpose of the Church, he tells them to baptise in the name of the Father, Son and the Holy Spirit. We are not to simply relate to God in some ambiguous, vague, or indefinite way. Rather, Jesus gives us the name for each person of the Trinity.

We are invited into an intimate relationship with God and that begins at baptism. The name of God includes all three persons: Father, Son and Spirit. Jesus reveals the name of God and of each person of the Trinity so that we can know what we need to know about God.

Knowing names is important. There is a level of connection that is established when we know someone's name. On the other hand it is hard to advance much in a relationship if you don't know someone's name. Besides, we show great respect for people when we know their name. We are drawn to people who care enough to know our name. So, this week our assignment is simply to get to know the names of some of our neighbours. I've already admitted that I am not a good neighbour. I'm the neighbour who likes to retreat into my own space. And, as proof of how bad a neighbour I am, I hardly know the names of any of my neighbours. Why don't you identify one or two neighbours whose names you don't know and get to know them this week? Then, add their names to your prayer intentions.

Jesus gives us this huge mission to go out into all the world to bring people closer to him. God calls us to build his kingdom, to renew and restore the world. And yet, much of it comes down to some very simple steps we can take just next door.

Pray for your neighbours and then get to know their names so you can pray for them by name. And, when you have the opportunity, greet them by name.

You know, one of the sweetest sounds to anyone's ears is the sound of their name, called by someone who cares about them.

LOCKDOWN REPORTS – Meal Deliveries and 1000 Dinners

Like many of the best lockdown initiatives, this one began with people whose immediate response was to think ‘What can we do to help? Who is in need?’

This week we’re looking at the hot meal delivery service that ran for the first months of lockdown – a loose and improvised collaboration linking up people from our parish SVP (St Vincent de Paul society) with First Bite (who ran the Community Café in St Peter’s pre-Covid) and Red Radish, a company that does catering for film sets. As everything else was off the menu (sorry!) how about providing meals for people who were badly affected by the pandemic?

A few phone calls later and the system was set up. The meals would arrive by van each evening at the Lido carpark after 6pm – hot and so needing quick delivery. The volunteers would then get going taking the heatproof boxes and insulated bags round to the happy eaters – mostly older and single, but some families. The recipients usually got them within an hour of the van’s arrival in Winchester.

This was part of a big operation: we had around 7 volunteers delivering 15 meals every evening, and there were many other groups doing the same all round the area. The meals – everyone agrees – were really good ones, delicious food, vegetarian options, made with fresh food. There have also been frozen meals donated, which were stored in Winnall and taken to families who needed them.



The SVP reacted quickly to the new circumstances: that’s what they do. At all times they work with those in need, often behind the scenes, helping families who lack the basics, or giving them a break, a day out. They make regular visits to people who may be struggling or just need a helping hand from time to time. They distributed Harvest Hampers in the Autumn, and then more hampers again at Christmas for local families. They also raise funds for international projects. The SVP has been supporting need in the parish for 100 years, while Petercares, our telephone befriending service, is very new. But with both operating now, our Parish is trying to reach out more than ever to people in need. If you can help in any way, or know of anyone we should contact, please get in touch.

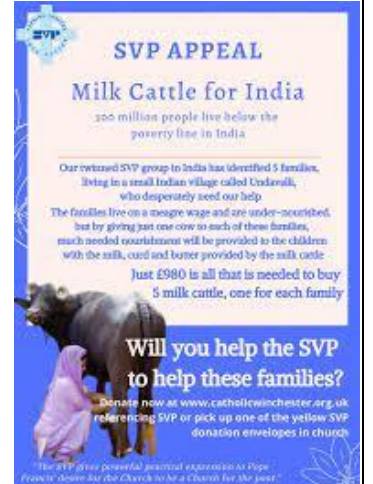
A Very Big Thank You!

The SVP would like to thank parishioners for their generous donations to the recent appeal to support the provision of milk cows to five families in Undavalli, one of the SVP’s twinned villages in India. In addition to raising the funds required for all five of the cows, we have been able to provide further financial support in helping our five twinned SVP Conferences to cope with the very difficult Covid situation. These additional funds were matched pound for pound by SVP central funds.

“... I am much involved in arranging hospital beds and volunteering by assisting Covid patients for their needs, in some houses all are covid positive, we arrange their basic needs and support in all possible way ...

In these situations, I stretch my hands for the prayer request for the people of India. It's a hard time we are facing day by day. Only God Himself can shower His mercy on us through your prayers. I wish and pray that even this situation will pass on and we will be back to our normal life... “Please continue to keep the work of the SVP in your prayers, especially in the UK and India.

The team at St Peters are currently keen to ‘grow’ their group of volunteers and would like people to consider joining them as much help is needed over the course of the year. “No qualification is needed, it would simply involve taking a turn to do a flower arrangement and then looking after it for two weeks, watering as necessary. An arrangement can be for a special intention like an anniversary. Christmas and Easter are particularly special because everyone comes together to help and we really enjoy the camaraderie. Please think about it and offer your help; if you’re not sure about it, you could shadow one of us to see what we do - all that is required is simply a love of flowers to grace our Church.”

Message from St. Peter's School

Pentecost



Currently our children are learning in R.E. about the Feast of Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples after Jesus had ascended into Heaven, and the mission Jesus gave to his disciples. Our youngest will learn that the Holy Spirit came at Pentecost and Jesus' promise to his disciples. They will also learn that we celebrate the birthday of the church at Pentecost. Meanwhile, those who are slightly older learn about the Holy Spirit during Mass, as well as thinking about how the Good News shaped the lives of different saints and our lives today. Finally, our older children learn about the gifts and fruits of the Holy Spirit and how they impact on our lives today. Also, they will be thinking about the importance of the Sacrament of Confirmation.

Meanwhile our wonderful kitchen staff made up tasty biscuits in the shape of doves and flames, symbols of the Holy Spirit for us to enjoy and help us to celebrate the birthday of the Church.



Year 5 have been studying the symbols of the Holy Spirit as part of their Pentecost topic in RE. The artwork completed on Friday was their own interpretations of these symbols.



'They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to talk in other languages.' Acts 2:4
