Does Love Last Forever? Love sacrifices/lays down its life

#### Fr Mark writes:

We've been thinking a lot about love over these last few weeks, asking, "Does love last forever"? Easter celebrates that love lives – God is love and love lives and lasts forever. Moreover, the same power that gave Jesus the ability to love is available to us too, so that we can love those around us the way we really want to love them.

This July it will be 20 years since Bishop Crispian ordained me to the priesthood. My ordination prayer card contained one of the prayers which we use during the Stations of the Cross:

I love you, Jesus, my love above all things.

I repent with my whole heart for having offended you.

Never permit me to separate myself from you again.

Grant that I may love you always, and then do with me what you will.

I've discovered there are advantages and disadvantages to being in a loving relationship with someone who loves perfectly! I know, for example, that Jesus will always be faithful to me, he will never let me down or do anything to hurt me, he won't sulk and will always forgive. However, it also brings into a very sharp focus how far I fall short of reciprocating that perfect love and how much I still need to learn.

The Gospel chosen for my ordination was from St. John, in which Jesus says to his disciples:

"This is my commandment: love one another as I have loved you."

The challenge for me, then, isn't just to love Jesus perfectly but to love you, our parishioners, just as Jesus loves me and you.

It certainly makes love very real and concrete, a lived reality to which I'm called, day in and day out. What is real love? Generous love? What does it look like to love as Jesus loves? What WOULD it look like for me to love you, my parishioners, with total generosity?

If I'm perfectly honest, it's one thing to love you all when I'm "going downhill with the wind behind me"...when I've got out of bed on the right side and all is well with the world. But love is commanded and demanded of me even when I'm tired or busy or overwhelmed with calls for my attention, when I'm under pressure or shaken by the latest emotional roller coaster ride. Love is commanded and demanded not just when I feel proud as a parish priest of how well you're supporting each other through tough times, reaching out to those in need and praising God wholeheartedly; but also when I come across moaning and squabbling; strangers ignored, a focus on self-centred, consumerist needs or just plain apathy.

How about you and your relationships?

- What would it look like to love your husband and wife as lavishly as Jesus loves them?
- What might you see and experience if you were loving your children with perfect love?
- What difference might it make if you loved all your friends generously?

If you're married, for example, how do you love your husband or wife when:

- She wants to go out and you want to stay in?
- You want Italian and he wants burger and chips?
- She asks you to take the dog for a walk in the rain?

When we get specific, when we drill down into the meaning of practical love; this one aspect of love slowly rises to the surface... If you were to list times you have truly felt loved by people around you, this thread would be weaved through all the examples we could think of: sacrificial love; love that sacrifices itself for another.

Let's look at this once more through the first letter of St. John, and in particular our second reading this weekend:

"My dear people, let us love one another, since love comes from God" (1 John 4:7)

Love comes from God. This is a reminder, an important one for many of us, that God is not angry or vengeful...We are not dealing with a god of Greek mythology. Our image of God is really important and John is telling us, when you think of God, don't think of Santa, don't think of the teacher you most dislike, or a harsh judge, or a disciplinarian. When you think of God, you should think of LOVE in all its fullness.

"Everyone who loves is begotten by God and knows God. Anyone who fails to love can never have known God, because God is love." (1 John 4:7-8)

Love is God's nature, so if you know love, you know God. You cannot separate love and God. It's even more impossible than Ant without Dec!

"God's love for us was revealed when God sent into the world his only Son..." (1 John 4:9)

God is the Creator of everything that exists...in Winchester and Washington, in Stockbridge and Stockholm, in Alresford and Algeria; everything on this beautiful blue planet and in our solar system; everything in the Milky Way and in our whole universe, the entire multiverse...God has the power and wisdom and majesty and might to create all of that.

Our big and powerful and perfect God, who is worthy of adoration and worship and infinite glory, chose to leave heaven's perfection, to make himself so small, to enter into our universe and galaxy and solar system and to be born on earth as a baby in a manger. He denied himself of his rights and privileges, his authority and power and control in order to become human, to get headaches and stub his toe, to feel pain and suffering. Why did he sacrifice all of that? Why did he demonstrate such sacrificial love for us?

"God's love for us was revealed when God sent into the world his only Son so that we could have life through Him." (1 John 4:9)

That is love. That is sacrificial love, for our sake.

John continues:

"This is the love I mean: not our love for God but God's love for us when he sent his Son to be the sacrifice that takes our sins away." (1 John 4:10)

God offers us this life through his sacrificial love. God did this for us. God took the initiative. Sacrificial love is when you deny yourself what you have or deserve for someone else's good.

How, then, do we love one another through self-sacrificial love? At the beginning of this passage, John wrote to his "dear people". The Greek word used is probably better translated, however, as "beloved". Perhaps this is the key: "be loved".

You cannot give what you don't have and so to love one another as Jesus has loved us, we need to let ourselves be filled up with God's love. St. Paul prayed for this: that you might grasp how high, and wide, and deep and long is the love of Christ – and know this love that surpasses knowledge – that you may be filled to the measure of the fullness of God. Some of us just need to be filled up! Then we can "be love".

Today's Gospel gives us a strikingly similar message regarding self-sacrificial love:

"A man can have no greater love than to lay down his life for his friends." (John 15:12-13)

Be loved.

And be love.

#### **Thy Kingdom Come - Novena to the Holy Spirit**

The Great Feast of Pentecost will soon be upon us, when we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit given to Mary and the Apostles, and so also to the early Church. After Ascension, which we celebrate this Thursday, those first disciples were told by Jesus not to leave Jerusalem but to wait there "for what the Lord had promised" (Acts 1:4). We too, then, are invited to "wait for what the Lord has promised us", namely the Holy Spirit. Please would you consider offering a Novena to the Holy Spirit from Friday 14th May to Saturday 22nd May for a new outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon us as individuals, upon our parish, our diocese and upon Winchester and the surrounding towns and villages. On Friday 14<sup>th</sup> May, and Monday 17<sup>th</sup> – Friday 21<sup>st</sup> May, we will include the Novena prayer as part of morning prayer and adoration. It will also be included as part of the mass on Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> and Saturday 22<sup>nd</sup> May and during Night Prayer on Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> May. This gives us the wonderful opportunity to pray the Novena together, either in person or online.

Thy Kingdom Come is a global prayer movement, which invites Christians around the world to pray during this same period for more people to come to know Jesus Christ. As Catholics, we can support this initiative with our Pentecost Novena, Prayer of the Faithful and an encouragement for us to pray, as we normally do, with the particular intention for our loved ones to come to faith in Jesus Christ.

## A visit from the Mayor of Winchester

## A Closer Look at Our Churches

Thank you to Mike Roe for sharing this beautiful photograph he took of a carving found in St Peter's Church.



Mike kindly provides us with some insight into the carving in the following extract from the booklet we produced about the history of St Peter's:

"Below the tabernacle are carved the symbols of the four Evangelists, the authors of the Gospels - the winged man symbolises St. Matthew; the winged Lion, St. Mark; the winged bull, St. Luke; and St. John, an eagle.

In the centre is depicted the **Agnus Dei** ('Lamb of God') carrying the Banner of Resurrection (or victory over death), standing on the book of seven seals (referred to in Revelation 5:1) representing the judgement of Christ. On either side appears the monogram 'IHS', a contraction of the Greek spelling of 'Jesus Christ' ".

It would be wonderful to share photographs taken in all four of our beautiful churches and to learn something of the meaning behind their different features so please do send them in and we will include them in future newsletters. You do not need to know the significance behind the items as we will gladly investigate that for you.

#### **LOCKDOWN REPORTS – KEEPING IN TOUCH**

We've been looking at the different initiatives we got going during lockdown - this time we're looking at our telephone befriending service 'Petercares.'



PeterCares was started with a seemingly simple brief, which was to set up a telephone befriending service to reach out to those most affected by the initial lockdown and accompanying social restrictions. We wanted to ensure that while our church buildings were closed, our parishioners still felt fully included and supported. Of course, our very swift move into the digital world was especially difficult for some parishioners with PeterCares doing quite a bit of initial advocating on their behalf. Our callers have been able to share news from the parish and pass on prayer and candle requests etc. However, as things moved from responding to a short-term/time-limited crisis into the need to respond to the 'long-haul', and uncertainty, of social restrictions/isolation we have been 'accompanying'/journeying with' those called through the full range of 'life events' they have experienced over the past year.

By working through the parish database and by receiving nominations from our clergy and ministry leads, as well as writing to all the nursing and care homes in Winchester, PeterCares has contacted 292 households. 31 of our parishioners have been involved in making calls over the past year and currently we have 22 active callers who are in regular contact with 85 households and 2 new callers preparing to come on board. Through the ongoing contacts some strong bonds/relationships have developed between our callers and those called, as well as an opportunity to engage with a contact's wider family depending upon who picks up the phone! In this way we have been able to provide greater support as inevitable life events occurred and callers moved from responding to initial frustrations and fears relating to isolation to providing support following the death of a loved one [both Covid and non-Covid related], receipt of a life-changing medical diagnosis or stresses in and external to the family. When befriending is not enough the person being called has a sensitive transition to another Ministry if appropriate or an external service. All involved in this ministry are receiving such blessings from the service. One of our contacts likes to sing to their caller, others have discovered connections of which they would not have been aware otherwise and are enjoying swapping their experiences. Our callers get a 'buzz' from making a difference to others' lives and hold their contacts in prayer.

Moving into a care home or other facility/ or moving away from Winchester, has also been a life event experienced by some of those called. There are a couple of parishioners who moved away at the start of the pandemic and, because of the restrictions, have been unable to make links in their new parishes. Calling has enabled them to "have a home" and when the time comes, they will be ready to make new connections, so while most of our contacts are based in the Winchester district, we also have connections in the West Country and the North East of England.

One of the newest members of our team shares her first impressions: 'Great care has gone into the setting up of this Ministry with the expertise of the supervisors ensuring that all the people who are contacted have the best service they can be given. This goes from the careful selection of callers to the training and to the supervision available to each. This is a people centred service and a prayerful one. It is so good to be contributing to the team and although we take our work very seriously there is always chance to see the funny side of this strange time we are living through, which includes putting on my mask to attend one of our regular Zoom meetings before I remembered that I wasn't actually needing to leave the house!'

As restrictions are eased, needs change and life moves on, PeterCares is exploring how best to develop its ministry to respond to the challenges of coming out of lockdown. For some this prospect is troubling, some have lost confidence, others must develop new ways of doing things due to changes in their life situations, deteriorating health etc. We are encouraged to know though, that one of our '80 years plus' contacts is busy getting on with her life and while she enjoys her PeterCares calls, she doesn't sit around waiting for the phone to ring! Some of those who were being called through PeterCares are now simply good friends with their caller and no longer being 'officially' called through PeterCares. This is likely to happen in more instances as social contacts become possible.

We think that all the above helps to illustrate how PeterCares 'is Church'.


## Message from St. Peter's School
