Confessions of a Control Freak

Fr Mark writes:

This weekend, we are beginning a brand new series of messages which we're calling 'Confessions of a Control Freak'.

I admit that I can be a bit of a perfectionist, a pedant and a control freak, at least in some aspects of my life...but I suspect I'm not alone. And even if you're not a control freak, you probably know one, and maybe even live with one.

Maybe you take out the dirty dishes that others put into the dishwasher and rearrange them, or you store your jumpers or cardigans in order of colour or, of all the parents on the football/rugby/cricket pitch, you're the worst, so that your children beg you not to attend their games...I think nearly all of us are control freaks in one way, shape or form, and to varying degrees.

With that in mind, let's look at our passage from Mark's Gospel for this weekend.

Jesus was setting out on a journey when a man ran up, knelt before him...(Mark 10:17a)

We know from the other Gospels and from some of the verses ahead, that this is not just any person. He has a lot going for him. He's rich, he's young, and he holds some kind of prominent position. This is the Marcus Rashford or Jennifer Lawrence of his day.

Mark tells us that he runs up to Jesus and kneels down. That's kind of strange isn't it? People of prominence and in wealth and influence don't do that. If you're a prominent person, people run after *you* and clamour for *your* attention. So, we learn that, for everything he's got, he knows something is missing from his life. He's seeking something *more*. And he does it by asking this question:

Good master, what must I do to inherit eternal life? (Mark 10:17b)

The rich young man has caught a glimpse of this eternal life, this life which God filled with joy and peace and love. He has glimpsed it in the person of Christ himself, so he wants to know what he can do to have it, as a possession.

Jesus begins to answer the question with a refresher in the basics of Biblical teaching:

"You know the commandments: you must not kill; you must not commit adultery; you must not steal; you must not bring false witness; you must not defraud; honour your father and mother." (Mark 10:18-19)

Jesus reminds him that can't do these things as part of your lifestyle and enjoy the quality of life God wants to give you. They don't go together. I don't think that is news to you. Although if it is news to you, *now you know*.

The rich young man certainly knew. But the basics weren't enough for him. He wanted more.

"Master, I have kept all of these from my earliest days." Mark 10:20

He follows the rules but instinctively he knows there must be more to a relationship with God.

The heart of the Gospel is not about religious rule keeping. It is about so much more, about positioning ourselves to receive the good things that God want to give us. The heart of the Gospel is about building our life on a living relationship with a loving God, leading us to love others in return. But, the difficulty is that if you want a faith that goes beyond religious rule-keeping you've got to do something beyond just following the rules.

Jesus looked steadily at him and loved him...(Mark 10.21)

Jesus' instructions and teachings never come out of anything but love. He loves you and is for you, even when his teachings sound challenging, as this young man is about to learn.

"There is one thing you lack. Go and sell everything you own and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." (Mark 10.21)

Ironically, what he is lacking is yoked to what everyone else would have thought of as is greatest asset: his wealth. His money is crippling him, because it is controlling him, it is keeping him from the life God has in mind for him. If he is ever going to know that life, he's going to have to give up control of his money. Notice that this is a little bit more nuanced than it might seem at first. Jesus didn't say, get rid of your wealth and live in poverty. Jesus told the man to give up his money and possessions not to be altruistic or because it is wrong to have money. He told him to give up his earthly money, something that is temporary, in order to trade it in for something eternal. He is inviting the rich young man into a life on a whole new level of living and giving, a life that is actually richer, and leads to even greater wealth, by giving up control of the one thing that he most wanted control of. And how does the rich young man respond?

But his face fell at these words and he went away sad, for he was a man of great wealth. (Mark 10.22)

Maybe the rich young man didn't even hear everything Jesus said. As soon as Jesus said 'go sell everything you have', the rich young man couldn't hear anything else. He couldn't hear the part about having treasure in heaven and he didn't hear the part about following Jesus because he couldn't imagine a life worth living without his stuff. He knew that there had to be more, but he went away sad. He went back to the very thing that had failed to satisfy his heart. Jesus gave him the exact advice he needed. And yet he couldn't do it. He couldn't give up control.

This isn't a message about money, or at least not necessarily. It's about your heart. In your heart and in mine, is the very same desire. The desire of our heart is for a more abundant life. A life that God, by the way, promises us, a life God can give us. Unless, like the rich young man, we're holding on to something else instead. Is there something you need to let go of in order to receive, in order to be able to receive the gifts and blessings God intends to give you? Is there something that if God asked you to let go control of it you would struggle?

And ps, the answer is "yes" for all of us. The point of this series is to identify those things and make different decisions. Rather than going back to business as usual, we will surrender it to God and trust him with it.

- *Maybe that is money for you, but maybe not.*
- *Maybe it is other people's opinions and what they think of you.*
- *Maybe you need to let go of trying to control other people, like your employees or your children.*

We are going to examine what it is that God is calling us to give up control over.

This week, I invite you to read this passage again. Read it every day this week as part of your quiet time. Read it and put yourself in the scene. Imagine it. He's speaking to you. What's he asking you to let go of that makes you want to run away? He's asking you to let it go not because he wants something from you, but because he wants something for you.

October is the month of the Holy Rosary, and the 7th was the Feast of the Holy Rosary.

The origins of the rosary as a prayer are unclear. It is said that it was given to St. Dominic by the Virgin Mary in a vision. Be that as it may, the popularity of the rosary certainly grew through the preaching of St. Dominic (who died in 1221) and the Dominican friars during their missionary work.

In the 16th century, Pope Pius V encouraged praying the rosary for deliverance from an imminent Turkish Muslim invasion of Europe. Following a decisive victory in 1571, the Pope established the Feast Day in thanksgiving. The rosary shown here (from the Parish Archive) was given to Canon Gunning in 1894. The Canon served Winchester all his priestly life – 54 years. This rosary, with olive wood beads, is unusual for there is a small relic of St. Dominic contained in the crucifix. It is currently on display, with other memorabilia of the Canon, in the Pastoral Centre.

Invitation to pray the Rosary after 10am Mass on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday in the Lady chapel and we encourage anyone to join in with this especially in this month of the Holy Rosary.

Now Accepting Contactless Donations

We're all carrying less cash as more and more transactions are made contactlessly, the move away from cash having been accelerated by the COVID outbreak, where society has been encouraged to use digital forms of payment. We feel it is important that we give our parishioners and visitors the opportunity to give to the Church contactlessly too. **So, from next weekend, the 16th October, we are introducing yet another easy way to support our parish by enabling donations the contactless way.**

There will be two contactless terminals (pictured) in St Peter's Church which will allow you to easily and instantly make a donation using your debit card. You will find these new contactless terminals in the back of church, one by the South door (to the left as you leave church) and one by the West door (the main exit). Just use your contactless debit/credit card or smart phone/ device to make a donation. Simply choose the amount you wish to donate and hold your card onto the reader.

You can also opt-in for Gift Aid to increase your donation by 25%. If you are a UK taxpayer, then donating with Gift Aid means that we can claim an extra 25p for every £1 received. Just add your details to the contactless device.

Contactless donations are safe and secure, minimising contact and removing the need to carry cash. We really do appreciate your continued support and thank you for helping our parish community.
