Baptism of the Lord - Year C

The Story of Your Life (Baptism of the Lord)

Fr Mark writes:

We like stories. From the time we are children, we love them. Good stories engage us, entertain us, can teach us and change us and, every once in a while, a story will inspire us. One reason we like good stories is simple...our lives are a story. Your life is a story. You are living a story...so what could possibly be more interesting to you than a story? You have already lived part of that story and those past stories of yours shape your current story. And, one day, this time of your life and how you have chosen to live it will be a story you tell to your children or that others tell about you. Your story matters... but... perhaps not the way you might expect.

Your story isn't important because of you, its important because of God. In fact, I hate to tell you, but you're not even the central character in your story. God is the central figure in your story. Your story is important because of him and the role he plays in it. And you'll never even understand your own story unless and until you understand it in the context of the larger story God is telling. The choice you have is whether to live it only within the narrow confines of your own little story, or to join your little story to God's great big one.

Today is a feast celebrating Baptism...the Baptism of the Lord. We remember the beginning of Jesus's ministry, the beginning of his public story. And right from the beginning his story is placed in the context of God's great big story. The Bible tells us:

while Jesus after his own baptism was at prayer, heaven opened and the Holy Spirit descended on him in bodily shape, like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; my favour rests on you.' (Luke 3:21-22)

Throughout the Bible, God will remind us, from time to time, that he's there and that he is Creator and sustainer of everything. All that we see, all that we have, all that we're grateful for and all that we take for granted is only here because he chose to create it and then give it to us.

Our faith, simply put, says: there is a God and it is not you. I am only here because God chose to create me. You are only here because God chose to create you. He is the original author of your story.

Think about the issues of your life that are beyond your control, that God simply assigned you and that you had no say in whatsoever.

- ❖ You had no control over when you were born
- ❖ Or where...what environment you were born into, affluence or poverty or somewhere in between
- ❖ You had nothing to say about your physical features
- ❖ You had no control over who your parents are
- ❖ You had no control over your siblings and where you are in the birth order
- ❖ You had no control over your general personality, whether you are naturally introverted or extroverted
- ❖ You had no control over your talents and gifts

All of it was assigned to you by the original author of your story.

Now, I am not saying that everything that happened to you as a child was what God wanted for you, because there are a lot of things that happen that are actually against God's will. I am, however, saying that you are not the original author of your life...and besides everybody else that was involved, especially your parents, God is responsible. You are not the original author of your story and it is critically important that you recognize that and know it, and grow in appreciation and understanding of the real story you're really in.

It's important to invest time in knowing your story, or get to know it better. If you do, I guarantee you will learn more, far more than you ever thought you would and you will be surprised by what you learn. To help you get started get we have some questions on our website to help you begin sorting out the beginning of your story. Where does your story start, what happened to you? As you do, form that exercise into a conversation with God. And honestly share with him your emotions about those memories, because probably you do have emotions, perhaps deep-seated ones. Your emotions might be clearer than your memories, depending on your story.

Think about them and share them with God. Maybe you have lots to be grateful for; perhaps you have lots that makes you sad or even angry. Did you know that God has insights into your story that you don't, and you won't without his help? He can help you understand your story better. And a good way to start tapping into those insights is sharing your feelings with him. Tell him how those memories feel...Be honest with him about how you feel. It's OK, God can take it. He can handle it. For some of you, it would open up a wave of communication with God and transform your relationship with him.

Whatever your feelings, all of us have parts of our story that we wish were written differently. You need to wrestle with the specifics of your story, the particularity of it, the seemingly random or even unfair aspects. As you do, as you explore the beginning of your story, remember, it is not the beginning of the story that's most important. It is important, of course, because it sets the context, it establishes the theme, it matters a whole lot...but it's not the most important part.

What is most important is not the beginning, it's not the circumstances you found yourself in that determines everything, it's how you react to those circumstances, it's what you do, and then what you do after that. Understanding the beginning of your story helps you to write a better story in the future moving forward.

As you begin your conversation about your story with God this week, keep in mind what he's already told you about that story. God said:

'You are my Son, the Beloved; my favour rests on you.' (Luke 3.22)



That's you. That's your story, that's where your story begins....you are the beloved son or daughter of God, he is pleased with you...maybe he's not always pleased with everything you do, but he is pleased with you, he made you just the way he wants you to be.

Announcement of the Date of Easter And Moveable Feasts At some of this weekend's Masses, there will be a formal announcement of the date of Easter and other "moveable feasts" such as Ascension, Pentecost and Corpus Christi, whose dates vary from year to year. It also includes the date of the First Sunday of Advent. While most of us have paper or electronic calendars, or can find such dates using Google, this formal proclamation, early in the Church's year, reminds us that all time is consecrated to the Lord. When chanted, the announcement uses the same tone as is used for the Exsultet at the Easter Vigil, as a reminder of the centrality of the resurrection of the Lord in the liturgical year, and throughout our lives.

Baptism Celebratory Mass – Postponed Due to concerns regarding the current Covid19 situation, the decision has been made to set another date for this special celebration. Families will be notified by the Baptism team once the new date and time is confirmed.

The Epiphany On Thursday 6th January, we celebrated the Feast of “The Epiphany” when traditionally the three Kings found the Holy Family in Bethlehem and presented gold, frankincense and myrrh. In Christian art, the scene is usually a kneeling king offering his gift, whilst Joseph is in the background. This wood carving in the Parish Archive is different. The kings stand at the back and it is Joseph who kneels to make a presentation; now unfortunately broken. The infant Jesus on Mary’s lap holds out an accepting hand. The first gift lies at Mary’s feet and the right-hand king still holds his. This 16th century German or Flemish work is free-standing and was probably commissioned for private devotion, rather than for a church.

Synodal Process Some of you will be aware that Pope Francis is inviting us as a Church to learn to “walk together” (that’s what ‘synod’ means). In our own parish the ESG (Evangelisation Strategy Group) are taking on the responsibility for how we as a parish respond to the request from the Pope.



I’ve asked that they do so in a way which allows all those who wish to have their voice heard to be enabled to do so, that reaches out to the peripheries and even beyond the parish community, and that enables us to respond to the questions. Details to follow soon into this New Year (we had planned earlier but the Pope has given us an extension), so please watch this space...
