


Easter Triduum 14th April 2022 Maundy Thursday Mass of the Lord's Supper



Introductory Rites

Entrance Procession

- 1. The glory of the cross we sing, the cross of Jesus Christ our Lord, who died and rose to set us free, our way from death to life secured.
- 2. As once God's people rested safe, protected by a lamb's own blood, so we acclaim the sacrifice of Jesus Christ the Lamb of God.
- 3. As once the Chosen People passed from pain to freedom through the sea, so now baptismal water saves the chosen, called to liberty.
- 4. At Passover before He died Christ Jesus took the bread and wine: "This is my body, this my blood, do this as my memorial sign."
- 5. What once by Jesus was achieved we celebrate with heart and soul, recalling and effecting now the saving work that makes us whole.

The oils which were blessed by Bishop Philip at the Chrism Mass at St John's Cathedral, Portsmouth are brought forward in procession: the Oil of the Sick, the Oil of Catechumens and the Oil of Chrism.

After each oil is presented, we sing






Verses (by Choir):





Communion Procession

During the Communion procession, please sing after each verse sung by the cantor



- 2. This is what we understand: that when we eat and drink this feast In this bread which we are breaking, Christ we are partaking, Christ's death proclaiming until his return.
- 3. This is how we are to live: that being joined by Christ's gifts, We should be Christ to others, sisters and brothers, Holding them precious as saved by his love.
- 4. Christ, our way, our truth, and life: we are not worthy to draw near: But take our praise and thanksgiving, transform our living, Give us that food which is healing and strength.

- 5. Love one another I have loved you, and I have shown you how to be free; Serve one another, and when you do, do it in love for me.


