Palm Sunday - Year C

Jesus, we bring everything to the foot of your holy cross, by which you have redeemed the world

Fr Mark writes:

“Dear Brothers and Sisters, since the beginning of Lent until now we have prepared our hearts by penance and charitable works. Today we gather together to herald with the whole Church the beginning of the celebration of our Lord's Paschal Mystery, that is to say, of his Passion and Resurrection. For it was to accomplish this mystery that he entered his own city of Jerusalem. Therefore, with all faith and devotion, let us commemorate the Lord's entry into the city for our salvation, following in his footsteps, so that, being made by his grace partakers of the cross, we may have a share also in his Resurrection and in his life.”

The Church asks for each of us to enter into every liturgy with “full, conscious and active participation”. That’s a hard task week in, week out as we try to put aside those unwanted distractions and, for those of us who struggle with mornings, to wipe the cobwebs away from our eyes! In essence, though, we’re asked to bring our lives, as they are, with all their worries, joys, fears, desires, hopes and pains and place them before the Lord, so that He may mould them and fashion them, shape them and transform them. By participating fully, consciously and actively, we’re allowing our embodied souls to engage with the reality of God’s healing and life-giving love. Our lives cannot be a “spectator sport” and neither can our celebrations of the sacred liturgy.

Here in our parish, over the last few weeks, we’ve been participating in our Spiritual Campaign for Lent, “Seriously, God? Making sense when life doesn’t make sense”. Fr Anthony and I have been offering homilies on this theme and many of you have been receiving daily emails of encouragement (and sometimes challenge) and/or reading the book that goes with the series and/or engaging in some deep and moving conversations in Lenten Small Groups. We’ve been trying, together, to grapple with some of those tough questions and issues that often keep us from taking God seriously or developing deeper faith and trust in God.

We have looked at how to make sense of those times when God says no. Jesus shows us that God’s no’s are to help us live in true freedom – freedom from being enslaved to our own desires, self-centred lifestyle and the opinions and whims of other people.

We have looked at those times when God seems to let us down and not fulfil his promises to us. We looked at the story of Abraham and how God sometimes delays his response to build trust and obedience in us. We looked at changing our question from “why me” to “what are you teaching me about you, God?” God will work things out in his timing, in the fullness of time.

We have looked at why God seems to allow the wrong people to be in charge. Why does God allow corrupt people to gain power? How does God allow people who abuse their power to be in positions of power? Why does he allow incompetent people to be in charge? We looked at what we could learn from the call of Moses. We learned that God sees his people suffering under corrupt leadership. He wants to lead his people to a better place. We can cry out for God to lead us to a better place but also consider whether God wants us to step up in our leadership.

We have looked at those times when God seems to be getting in our way, not doing what we want him to do. We looked at the elder son in the parable of the prodigal son and how he relates to the religious leaders who were grumbling and complaining. The elder brother sees the father as standing in the way of life and so is unable to see the

bigger picture of God’s grace at work, unwilling to share in the joy of the Father.

We’ve looked at the problem of pain and suffering. Pain is a significant argument against the Gospel and Christianity. However, the scriptures do not run from this issue but address it head-on. We looked at St. Paul and what he teaches us about looking past the pain and focusing on Jesus.

We’ve not pretended that these big questions and issues are easily solved, like a crossword puzzle or a quiz, where the answers are found neatly and succinctly at the back of the book. What we’ve hoped is that by wrestling with these topics together we can support each other and deepen our trust and faith in God.

As we arrive now at Holy Week, I want to invite you to bring all these questions and challenges, burdens and blessings, conversations and struggles with you to our liturgy (in person or on livestream) and to place them at the foot of the cross. We bring them before Jesus who died there, a young man, full of promise. Although we cannot provide an explanation for every human experience, the Cross offers us hope that God can take any suffering, any death, and bring about good from it. God used the suffering and death of his Son to redeem the whole world. He can therefore also take our suffering and the pain and death of our loved ones and use them for great good too.

The services of Holy Week are designed to allow us to become more aware of the saving mystery of God’s love in which we are called to participate. We are almost asked to engage in the events of that first Holy Week in slow motion, pausing to reflect on the various aspects of the mystery of Christ’s life, death and resurrection. I want to invite you to open your eyes and your noses to the rich symbols of this week, your ears to the words and music and silence, your mouths wide to proclaim boldly the responses and join in with the singing, your hands to embrace the cross he wishes to give you and your hearts to receive the fullness of his love.

The music, the words, even the precious moments of silence are ways in which God speaks to us this week. Each procession, each gesture, each symbol, each time we kneel or stand or listen or kiss or offer peace or light a candle or wash feet or sing or receive the Lord in the Eucharist is an invitation to participate more fully in God’s very own life of love: the life of the Father who sent His Son into the world; of the Son who died out of his unfathomable love for us and was raised to new life; of the Spirit who has been breathed into our souls.

There were actions recommended to encourage parishioners to examine their lives and look at ways they might reduce their consumption.

They are:

Setting up car shares

Supporting the parish ‘Covenant with the Poor’ providing funds for charitable projects in the UK and overseas.

The Live Simply Award was developed in partnership with the Catholic aid agency CAFOD to offer support and encouragement to put their faith into action.

All of this is part of the Laudato Si ethos and in future weeks we will try to link the aims of Live Simply with the need for families to reduce household costs in the light of the climate crisis and the increased cost of living.

Dear Parents
Music - "The school is alive with the sound of music!"

Music has been filling the classrooms and corridors this week as we come towards the end of term. Children have been working hard in music lessons towards their end of unit performances. This half term, Year 2 and 3 have been learning to play tuned percussion and to read music notation. They will be putting on a little performance to the Year 1s and their teachers to share what they have learned.

Year 4 are buzzing about brass! They have spent this term's Listen2me sessions learning to play trumpets, trombones and tenor horns. On Friday they put on a fantastic performance to parents to share what they have achieved. Some children have enjoyed learning brass instruments so much they have elected to take part in a taster scheme of small group brass lessons in the summer term.

Year 5 and 6 have been working on their keyboard skills. Year 5 have enjoyed exploring a piece called 'The Hall of the Mountain King' by Grieg. They all did a fantastic job in their end of unit assessment, where they showed off their keyboard technique and storytelling through their individual performances of the piece. Year 6 have been learning about Big Band Jazz. They have had a go at improvising and have all learnt and performed a jazzy number called 'Glen Miller Medley'.

Children are starting to think about if they would like to have instrumental lessons in KS2 next year. We have been lucky enough to have some of our fantastic team of instrumental teachers come in and demonstrate their instruments to us, and children have enjoyed hearing both the adults and their peers perform on all instruments giving us a taste of all the instruments that we can choose from.

The School Band have been rehearsing hard for what is set to be a fantastic Spring Concert in St Stephen's Church. They will be performing a range of pieces from 'Arriba' to 'James Bond' to 'Hand Clap'. Some of our instrumentalists will also be showing off their skills and performing solos. It is set to be a fabulous evening of music making.
