The Sunday of the Word of God				
Deacon Martin writes: This Sunday has been designated by Pope Francis as the "Sunday of the Word of God". The Holy Father encourages every parish to devote this day to "the celebration, study and dissemination of the Word". There are a number of ways in which we can join in this celebration. I am going to focus on just 2. First of all, I hope you will join me in thanking those who undertake the ministry of reader across our parish. We thank them for their faithful service in helping us to hear God's word at weekend and daily Masses. More readers are always welcome: contact the parish office if you feel called to this ministry, and they will pass you on to the relevant co ordinator of readers, for the church in the parish that you attend. Second, and something that should apply to each of us: perhaps this Sunday of the Word of God is an opportunity for each of us to deepen our own engagement with God's word. I invite you to make a commitment to spend 5 minutes each day in prayer using the Scriptures. This is one of the "6 holy habits" that Bishop Philip encouraged us to adopt in his pastoral letter that he sent to us in October. Perhaps we can re-allocate 5 of the minutes that we spend right now reading social media, or the newspaper, or watching videos on our phone, devoting that time instead to listen to the Lord, speaking to us in His word. But you may ask: how will I use that 5 minutes a day? How do I pray with Scripture? There are many answers to that question, but the Church's own tradition gives us one approach that She has been teaching for centuries. It is called	 2. The next sense is the allegorical sense. We might call it the "Jesus sense", for it encourages us to ask how the Scripture text is pointing to Jesus. This doesn't deny that the text had an original meaning, for the people for whom the human author originally wrote it – but it encourages us, in faith, to see how all Scripture ultimately points us to Jesus, through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. So let's start by asking ourselves: where can I see Jesus, or a hint of Jesus, in this passage? One way of doing it is to substitute Jesus for occurrences of "he" or "you" – and if we do this, we see that Jesus is the one who "confers glory" on this area of the world; Jesus is the one who has made a people joyful; Jesus is the one who has set them free from their oppressors. In this particular case, this Sunday's Gospel (Mt 4:12-23) gives us a huge helping hand, because Matthew makes clear that Jesus fulfils this specific text of Isaiah, by starting His ministry in Galilee, the very places in the north of Israel near the Sea of Galilee that had been "humbled". Jesus is now bringing light where before there was darkness; Jesus is promising freedom, and the kingdom of heaven, to those who repent – and He is already showing signs of that freedom by healing people of the oppression of illness. The third sense is the moral sense. It points us to what the passage may say 			
for yourself. Sunday's first reading is from the prophet Isaiah (Isa 9:1-4).  The first of the senses is the literal sense. In this first sense, we simply try to gain a basic understanding of what the passage is saying. So, we learn that a people that once walked in darkness have seen a great 	joyful whatever the immediate circumstances, or do I remain in "deep shadow"? The final sense is the anagogical sense, or perhaps more simply, the "hope sense" (anagoge in Greek means "leading up"). This sense helps us look to the future: where is the Lord leading us? What does this passage encourage us to hope for?

You might also find out why they were "humbled" and "in darkness" (they were being invaded by Assyria, the superpower of the time). And you might even get Google to help you with the significance of the name "Midian" (it refers to Gideon's miraculous victory, with the Lord's help, over the Midianites, described in the Book of Judges chapter 7; if you do get this reference, you will see a hint of the Lord saving His people despite apparently overwhelming odds). • But even if you don't have access to any of these aids, don't worry. Because let's return to the basic idea of the text – which is clear without any of the above knowledge: someone (even if we don't know who they were) was in trouble and suffering great despondency (I'm sure we can all get the idea of "darkness" as a metaphor for difficulty, and of "light" as hope, transformation, a way forward that can now be seen). And they have now become joyful, because "you" have broken the "yoke" of an "oppressor" (can we guess that this "you" is the Lord, as he has already been mentioned in verse 1?).

So, where can I see hints of God's plan of salvation?

So, it doesn't need a Scripture scholar to work out the literal sense: that

 a people who have endured great distress are now being made joyful –
 and the Lord has been the means of their freedom.

We pray that He will "confer glory" on us when He comes again. We hope for the "joy" of the kingdom of heaven, and the relief of the "yoke of oppression" of human suffering and death. The "light" can point us to the promise of eternal life with Him who is the source of heavenly light (see Rev 22:5). The "harvest" can be the work that the Lord will accomplish to gather humankind into the kingdom of God (see Mt 9:38).

Now, this won't all come easily, but it is worth persevering with. Perhaps if you don't feel confident alone, you can work through it each day with someone else: a friend, or spouse, or child (the latter are often the best interpreters of Scripture!) But the key purpose is to lead us into prayer, into hearing God speak to us. It's not study, or sharing (they also have their place): it's about you and the Lord – and learning to see and hear Him in His word.

A warm welcome back to Fr Mark as he returns from holiday on Monday 23rd January.


