Third Sunday of Easter - Getting in Position to Hope for Something Bigger

Fr Mark writes:

"Faith has to do with things that are not seen, and hope with things that are not at hand". (St. Thomas Aquinas)

Hope corresponds to our natural desire for happiness. It is faith directed to the future, anticipating the good that is coming, reaching to take hold of what we do not yet have, what is not yet to hand.

St. Luke tells us that on the evening of the very first Easter Sunday, two of Jesus disciples or followers were leaving Jerusalem. They were heading for a town called Emmaus, a journey that would have taken about two hours to complete on foot. They were walking away from the other followers of Jesus because they believe his movement was dead. Maybe they were at risk too, if people thought they were part of this movement.

They are walking west, into the sunset, at the close of day, which adds an element of melancholy to the tale that Luke tells. It is getting darker and darker. Luke continues:

Now as they talked this over, Jesus himself came up and walked by their side; but something prevented them from recognising him. (Luke 24:15-16)

Jesus himself draws near to them, but they don't recognize him. This can happen all the time. All we see is darkness. We focus only on the negative. Many times, we can find ourselves with thoughts or even conversations that go round and round and round in our heads but don't necessarily bring us any kind of clarity. We need some perspective and clarity that goes beyond our own current knowledge and understanding.

Then Jesus asks the 'elephant in the room question' to open up the difficult conversation. He prompts them to share what is in their heart.

'All about Jesus of Nazareth' they answered 'who proved he was a great prophet by the things he said and did in the sight of God and of the whole people; and how our chief priests and our leaders handed him over to be sentenced to death and had him crucified. Our own hope had been that he would be the one to set Israel free.' (Luke 24:19-21)

Our own hope *had been*. You can hear the sadness, the wistfulness. They used to hope but had stopped hoping. They'd lost hope. These are words of total hopelessness.

We could say that there are three degrees of hope. On the first level we find <u>casual hopes</u>.

- † I hope it doesn't rain today.
- † I hope it's pizza for lunch.
- † I hope Pompey win this week.

Casual hopes are good to have. They're good for our heart because positive thinking is more heart-healthy than negative thinking. It's just that whether these hopes are fulfilled is not of ultimate or even important consequence. When we lose out on casual hopes we experience some disappointment, but it is short lived.

On the second level of hope are <u>precious hopes</u>. These are hopes for the major areas of our lives.

- ♦ You hope to have a great and life-giving marriage.
- You hope to run a successful business that is respected and successful in your community
- ♦ You hope for good health and long life

Our precious hopes are far more valuable and much deeper than our casual hopes. When those hopes are dashed, it has a big impact, and it is sometimes heart-breaking. But a disappointment here need not leave us *completely* hopeless because there is still a deeper degree of hope.

Finally, there is our <u>ultimate hope</u>. Our ultimate hope is what we rest our hearts and souls upon.

When our hopes are in their proper places, attached to the right things, we are preserved from hundreds of heartbreaks and thousands of heart aches, and we flourish as more successful individuals. When our hopes are properly ordered it's a mark of maturity, a fruit of good character.

The problem, of course, is that we mix up these different levels of hope all the time. We turn casual hopes into precious hopes and make a precious hope our ultimate hope.

This is what these two disciples had done. They were hoping for a political reversal of fortunes for the nation of Israel....not a bad hope to have, just not an ultimate one...

'You foolish men! So slow to believe the full message of the prophets! Was it not ordained that the Christ should suffer and so enter into his glory?' Then, starting with Moses and going through all the prophets, he explained to them the passages throughout the scriptures that were about himself. (Luke 24:25-27)

Your hope was too small. You were hoping in something that was much smaller than God's plans. Through Jesus' death and resurrection and the faith it awakens, Israel would become a light to the nations and the hope of the world. That is God's bigger plan.

When they drew near to the village to which they were going, he made as if to go on; but they pressed him to stay with them. 'It is nearly evening' they said 'and the day is almost over.' So he went in to stay with them (Luke 24:28-29)

Freed from their focus on self, the two begin to listen to the stranger, to turn outward, even extending hospitality. The disciples move from their own sadness to a willingness to care for someone else. And it prepares them to recognize God's presence.

Now while he was with them at table, he took the bread and said the blessing; then he broke it and handed it to them. And their eyes were opened and they recognised him; but he had vanished from their sight. (Luke 24:30-31)

In the breaking of the bread, their eyes are opened, and they recognize Jesus, just as we recognise him in the Eucharist which we celebrate at the Altar.

With hope restored, they return to their friends, precisely to restore their faith and hope in turn.

So, what are you hoping for? What are you hoping for over these next few days or weeks or this year? Why not make a list. List as many things as you can think of. Make it a list of 10, 20 or 50. Then identify what kind of hopes you're hoping for. Is each one a casual hope, a precious hope or an ultimate hope

Then, in your quiet time this week, bring it to God. Make it a part of your prayer:

God, what do you want to do with this hope of mine. How does it fit into your larger story?

Maybe something that you think has dashed your hopes is a way in which God wants to raise up something far greater, far grander than you have imagined

Maybe you're hoping too small. Maybe you need to hope bigger.



The Season of Easter

Welcome back for the summer term, a term of many educational visits for the children, Masses to celebrate some of our important Church Feast Days, sports day with a family picnic and this year celebrations for the King's coronation. I hope you all had a lovely Easter – a time for family, friends and looking forward to the sun and growth we see in spring. As a school we focus also on the season of Easter – a time for giving thanks for Christ's resurrection following his death, and what that means for us both for today and for eternal life. The children are learning all about Easter in their RE - the scripture associated with this season and what it means to us as Christians today. Our youngest children will be learning about Jesus' resurrection and how the disciples felt when they saw the empty tomb, then realised that Jesus had risen. Lower KS2 will start to make links between the resurrection, Jesus' ascension into Heaven and the Christian belief in eternal life. Meanwhile, the oldest children will show a good understanding of eternal life by answering questions such as, *Does everyone have eternal life?* Class and school worship will be based on the joy of Easter.
