**TRINITY SUNDAY – Year A** 

Trinity Sunday - "O Love, you are my God, for you I long"

#### Fr Mark writes:

Who is the 'you' when we speak to God – "O God, you are my God, for you I long, for you my soul is thirsting"? Or, to put it another way, who picks up the phone when we pray to "God"?

It is not simply God the Father, as if we can think of Him without the other persons of the Trinity. Nor is it some divine essence, which we specify only later as God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit.

In our first reading this weekend, God reveals who He is to Moses. It is not the first time God has done this and the answer enriches the one he gave from the burning bush (Ex 3:1ff), the bush which burns but is not consumed. It reveals what happens when someone truly encounters the living God. "Moses said, 'I will turn aside . . . ." He is still thinking and exercising his will. He is still his own master. He is the one who is in charge (or believes he is in charge) of what is taking place. But now God bursts onto the scene and imposes his law.

Firstly, he calls Moses by name: "Moses, Moses". "Here I am" Moses replies. "Do not come near... "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." Everything has immediately changed. Moses suddenly becomes docile and submissive and he hides his face, like the Seraphim who cover their faces with their wings (see Is 6:2). The "numinous" is in the air. Moses enters into the mystery. In this atmosphere, when Moses asks God for a name, and God responds with the answer, "YHWH".

Countless Scripture scholars, theologians and others have wrestled with this answer, the 'tetragrammaton' or four-letter word, over the millennia. There are three main strands of thinking, all of them perhaps offering some insight.

One interpretation is that God is saying, "I am who I am" (or "I will be who I will be"). God is revealing Himself as the One who is. Addressing the Father, Saint Catherine of Siena said in her Dialogue, "I am she who is not...You alone are he who is; my being and every other grace that you have given me beyond my being I have from you, which you gave and give to me through love, and not because it was owed to me" (Ch. 134). Since only God exists by his own power and because everything else exists only because he created, Catherine recognized that everything she was and had came from God. God is pure. What we are apart from God is an abyss of nothingness.

Another view is that God is saying, simply, "I am here (or I will be here) for you". It refers more to the existence and presence of God than to his essence – more about "being here" than "what God is". Following this line, God is the Living God, a reality who is operative in history, someone Moses can rely on. The soul that thirsts for the living God is guaranteed to find Him and with Him will find everything else in Him, as the words of St. Teresa of Avila remind us:

Let nothing disturb you,
Let nothing frighten you,
All things pass away:
God never changes.
Patience obtains all things.
He who has God
Finds he lacks nothing;
God alone suffices.

St. Francis echoes this when, after encountering Christ in prayer following a period of darkness and discomfort, went around repeatedly exclaiming to himself, "Dieu est et cela suffit" ("God is and that suffices!"). He knew God was there and that was enough. How many of our own clouds might disperse by repeating these simple words to ourselves..?

A third line of interpretation is that God is deliberately giving a "non-answer", that the name 'YHWH' is deliberately ambiguous and untranslatable. In the Hebrew Scriptures (our Old Testament), when the name of the Lord is encountered, it is never spoken but always replaced by 'Adonai', which we translate as 'Lord'. We are not to use the name because using names implies a certain level of control over things (remember Adam was entrusted with naming the animals) and we do not and cannot have control over God.

This weekend is 'Trinity Sunday' and it's helpful for us to recall that when we speak of God as Trinity, we are speaking of God who is, of God who is with us, present to us and active in our lives and a reminder that when we talk of God, we don't really know what we're talking about. We cannot have control over God and we can never grasp God as some 'concept'. St. Augustine helpfully points out that if we understand fully then it's not God that we're understanding.

The passage in today's first reading finds Moses returning up the mountain, asking for a copy of the Law. He has smashed the first tablets in anger at the people's lack of faithfulness to God when he was up the mountain the first time. This time God reveals Himself in a richer way to Moses, as merciful (forgiving), gracious (a giver of gifts), kind (demonstrating compassion) and as faithful (steadfast and reliable). All of these are seen throughout the Bible, revealed in the context of God's covenantal relationship with His people.

The doctrine of the Trinity tells us that God is all these things — merciful, gracious, kind and faithful — in Himself, that is even if He has never created at all. Something like Love, which lies behind all these things, must belong to the very dynamics of God's being. Most religions will tell us that God loves. As far as I'm aware, it is only the Christian religion which boldly claims and tries to live out the message that God is Love.

The living God of Christians, in conclusion, is none other than the living Trinity. The doctrine of the Trinity is contained, in nuce, in a nutshell, in the revelation of God as love. To say, "God is love" (1 Jn 4:8), is to say God is trinity. Every love implies a lover, a beloved, and a love that unites them. Every love is a love for someone or something; there is no such thing as love "in a vacuum" that has no object.

There is something that is even more blessed that we can do with regard to the Trinity than contemplate and imitate it, and that is to enter into it! We cannot wrap our arms around the ocean, but we can enter into it; we cannot encompass the mystery of the Trinity with our minds, but we can enter into it! Christ has left us a concrete way to do that: the Eucharist.


