Nothing Must Get in My Way

Father Mark writes:

This Wednesday past, I ventured bravely with a niece and a goddaughter into the depths of Thorpe Park theme park. Rides like Nemesis and Swarm, Colossus, Detonator and Stealth, with various twists and turns and plunges were conquered bravely. There is one other ride that sticks in my mind, however: The Walking Dead.

“Thorpe Park Resort is overrun by Walkers and there is but one goal: survive. Making it to the sanctuary of the Safe Zone is vital for salvation. Located at the centre of the Island, navigate your way to the safety of the indoor bunker. But be warned: all signs point to an imminent invasion of Walkers and ahead, there’s a pitch-black abyss! Keep your head down and move quickly for your best chance of staying alive.”

As we disembarked from the roller coaster into a barely lit room, one of the young women from the same carriage thought she saw something, screamed, and began running for the exit through the dark passageway. This of course set off the rest of her friends, and my niece and goddaughter, who began running after her. This left me with the choice of trying to keep calm and collected whilst walking to safety on my own or running behind, with half an eye behind me...I ran...

In that final sprint for safety, there was only one thing on the mind of my niece and goddaughter: we simply had to get to the end of the tunnel as quickly as possible. Nothing, no one, was going to stop them from heading to that light and freedom!

Maybe at a theme park, perhaps in other situations, have you had your heart and mind so set on a goal, a destination, a mission, that you will let nothing stop you or come in your way.

- ✦ I must get that lead role / win that competition
- ✦ I need to get that job / get onto that course
- ✦ I have to have that nandos / Greggs / krispy kreme donut
- ✦ I need to marry her / him
- ✦ I must complete this 5k / finish my exams

Jesus, it appears, was driven by the need to fulfil his mission in Jerusalem.

This Sunday’s Gospel reading tells us that

“Jesus began to make it clear to his disciples that he was destined to go to Jerusalem and suffer grievously at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes, to be put to death and to be raised up on the third day.” (Matthew 16:21)

Other translations say, “he must go...” or “it was necessary for him to go...”he had to go...”

As painful and shameful and torturous as it was going to be, Jesus knew that this was why he had come into the world and nothing was going to stop him from fulfilling the mission entrusted to him by the Father.

There was nothing us humans could say or do – no amount of betrayal or spitting or mocking or flogging or injustice or shaming or denying, not even death itself – was going to stop him from loving us to the end.

Jesus simply loves you too much to let anything prevent him from giving himself freely so that we too might be free.

That is why he is able to say on the cross, “It is accomplished” and why, after the Resurrection he is able to breathe his life-giving Holy Spirit into his followers. His work of loving us into freedom was far, far too important to let any obstacle get in his way.

It is in this light that we can see why his rebuke to Simon Peter, the one who has literally just been entrusted with the keys of the Kingdom. Even though Peter had the very best of intentions, Jesus needs to say to him:

“Get behind me, satan! You are an obstacle in my path, because the way you think is not God’s way but man’s.”

Through Peter’s words, Jesus heard the tempter, trying to distract him from his goal, from his mission. Jesus was able to see the obstacle being put in his path, and, just as he did in the desert, Jesus rebuffs the temptation and sets his eyes on the goal, and the prize.

We too now have been entrusted with a mission. We’re being asked to “bring people to Jesus Christ, in hope and joy”.

This isn’t the job of just a handful of us – just the clergy or just the staff or just the ministry leaders – but rather a mission for all of us who’ve said, “yes” to Jesus.

Of course, there are times when we simply need to sit by Jesus’ feet, to be comforted by him, and to be fed and nourished by his word, his body and blood. There are times too when we need others to bring us to Jesus so that we can surrender to him once more and find our own healing and transformation. But, once comforted and fed and healed, we are sent out, like the mat carriers in the healing of the paralysed man in Capernaum, to bring people to Jesus, no matter what obstacles lie in our path, no matter what strange routes we might sometimes need to take. This is also how we step out of our own comfort zones and grow in our faith. We need to stay focussed. Our mission is just too important.

What might some of those obstacles be?

- ✦ Our own doubts maybe?
- ✦ Fear of embarrassment or abuse?
- ✦ The distractions of everyday life – as important as they are – like family and friends and work, or sometimes just our own comfort and pleasure?

Maybe this week I can invite you to reflect on where you are in your relationship to Jesus in this season...Are you in need of comfort, of feeding, of rest, of healing..? Do you need to receive Love? Or are you perhaps being ‘sent out’ to play your own part in the mission of bringing people closer to Jesus in Love?

Do you need for now to focus with a single mind on getting to Jesus, being with Jesus, or bringing people to Jesus? What must you do?

Lord Jesus, I wish to thank you for remaining focussed on your Mission of Love, despite all the distractions and obstacles that came across your path. Help me to re-commit today, to finding you, or being with you or bringing people to you. You know what I need from you in this season and what you need for me. Help me to see what I need to do and not to let anything distract me from that mission. Amen.

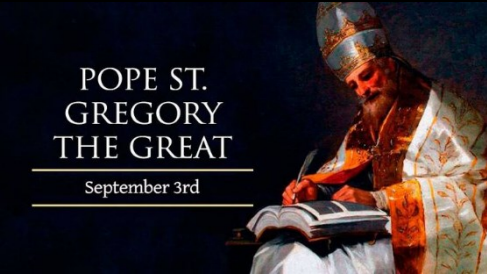

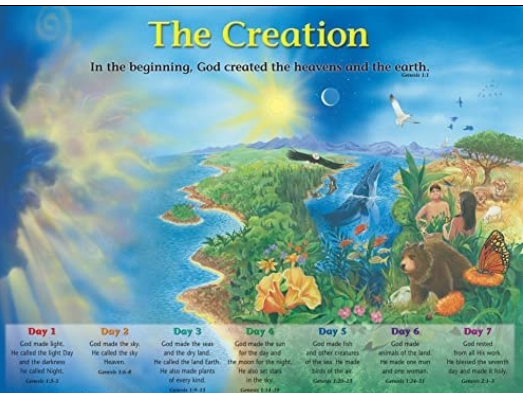
We have set up the email address centenary@stpeterswinchester.org.uk so you can send us your ideas and we look forward to hearing from you over the summer.

SVP – 100 years in the Parish

The Society of St Vincent de Paul (the SVP) has been active in our Parish for 100 years.

During September (SVP Awareness month) we will be sharing information about our work around the Parish, including in Peterpost.

This week we're focussing on the core of our work- providing friendship and support to those in need. We visit people in their own homes and nursing homes offering a friendly chat and a listening ear. Typically, during any month, we visit around 16 people, usually fortnightly, amounting to over 400 visits a year. The people we visit may be young or old, of any faith. Sometimes we're there just to help through a period of ill health, sometimes for longer. Occasionally, we may provide some simple practical support, such as arranging a lift to a hospital appointment.

We work in the background, keeping details of those we visit confidential.

Often a friend or relative may ask us to become involved or we may hear of people who would welcome a visit through the Parish clergy.

SVP members will be making an appeal each mass on the weekend of 2 and 3 September. The focus of the appeal will be on recruiting new members and asking for prayers.

Helping people who have just been awarded Leave to Remain by the Home Office

Refugees at Home writes:

Over the past three years processing of asylum claims has been woefully slow, leaving asylum seekers in limbo in temporary Home Office accommodation, unable to work, and with just a small weekly allowance.

Earlier in the year the Prime Minister made the welcome announcement that he would try to clear the asylum backlog, and process all legacy claims by the end of 2023. This process has seen a number of positive asylum decisions start to come in all at once, which is great news for the refugee families who can now begin their lives in safety. However, there has been a lack of strategic planning and local authorities now find themselves unable to cope with the number of new refugees presenting as homeless in their area.

Once a person receives refugee status they have just 28 days from the decision date before their asylum support ends and could receive a notice to vacate their accommodation with as little as 7 days notice. This time scale is impossibly tight. They need to wait for UKVI to send their Biometric Residence Permit and National Insurance Number, open a bank account, apply for Universal Credit and jobs and find a place to rent. The exclusion from work and education during their years in the asylum backlog leave them ill-prepared to understand the system.

Families with children will receive housing assistance from the council; however, most of the new refugees will need to find private rentals - this will be especially difficult for individuals under the age of 35, whose local housing allowance is in the region of £350 per month, and who have no credit history, no family to act as guarantors, and no-one to advocate for them. In recent weeks we have seen many people become homeless and destitute - the timescales don't allow for benefit payments to start before they need to leave their hotels or hostels.

How can you help? We would love you to share this information with your communities and encourage them to get involved.

1. We urgently need landlords who are willing to rent accommodation at Local Housing Authority rates and work with DWP/ councils to accommodate new refugees rapidly

2. We urgently need temporary hosts who can offer a room in their home, their annexe or granny flat.

There are a couple of agencies locally who are working to find hosts - they vet both the host and the guest to make sure they will be a good fit. Hosting placements can range from a few days respite accommodation, to a few months, allowing people time to get established in a job and build a little income. The most experienced hosting charity is Refugees at Home and a smaller local charity is Sanctuary Hosting - both are seeking hosts and home visitors.

3 Homeless shelters are full so the homeless are sleeping on the streets - we have been paying for some respite accommodation, a couple of nights in a hotel so people can shower and dry off their clothes after a few weeks on the street, but this is not sustainable. Can you offer a bed for a night?

4 We need many more befrienders, people who can help fill in UC forms, accompany refugees to banks, help them make viewing appointments, explain utility bills and more.
