Realigning - Loving People by Inviting them to the Feast

Father Mark writes:

We all want to be loving people. And we all know we have room for improvement. There is a gap, and when we're stressed or tested or stretched, that gap can grow. When we see people as God sees them, however, it is easier to love them as God loves them.

Today we are looking at a key way of loving people highlighted by a parable from the Gospel of Matthew.

"And again Jesus spoke to them in parables, saying, "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a wedding feast for his son, and sent his servants to call those who were invited to the wedding feast..."

Jesus used these parables, these stories because people love stories and they made people think.

Jesus says the kingdom of heaven is like a wedding, a big one. In the Jewish culture, there was no bigger party than a wedding feast. They meant even more then than they do today. A wedding feast would not just last for a day but for an entire week. Everyone in town would come out to a wedding feast because it was a huge break from the tedium and drudgery that characterized daily life. There would be food and drink and dancing.

So, any wedding would be a big deal. But *this* wedding was being given by a king. A king would have the best party imaginable, with the richest foods and the finest wines. No expense would be spared. It was an honour to be invited, a privilege, a tremendous opportunity. So, of course everyone would want to come, wouldn't they? Nope. Not this time.

"[The King] sent his servants to call those who were invited to the wedding feast **but they would not come.**"

That was absurd. So much so, that his audience probably laughed out loud. Nobody would refuse to come to such a wedding.

"Again he sent other servants, saying, 'Tell those who are invited, "See, I have prepared my dinner, my oxen and my fat calves have been slaughtered, and everything is ready. Come to the wedding feast."'

Everything is ready, the food is prepared. This second invitation is even more urgent. But the response is more pronounced...

"But they paid no attention and went off, one to his farm, another to his business..."

Previously they *refused* the invitation, now they *ignore* it and just get on with their daily duties as if nothing had happened. Worse still...

"...while the rest seized his servants, treated them shamefully, and killed them."

Here, the absurdity of the story turns dark. They murder the king's servants and the king in turn sees that justice is done. But the king still wants guests for his party, so...

"The wedding feast is ready, but those invited were not worthy. Go therefore to the main roads and invite to the wedding feast as many as you find."

The first group of guests proved themselves *unworthy. Why*? Simply because they rejected the invitation. Worthiness before the king is *determined solely* by a willingness or otherwise to accept his invitation. Since they proved themselves unworthy, the king's servants look for anyone who will accept the invitation.

"those servants went out into the roads and gathered all whom they found, both bad and good. So, the wedding hall was filled with guests."

They fill the hall and have a party.

In a parable someone is usually God and someone usually represents us or the people to whom Jesus addresses a parable. In this parable, God is

represented by the king. And the wedding feast is heaven.

The guests who refuse to come to the party represent the chief priests and religious rulers to whom he was speaking, who are rejecting his teaching and would be responsible for his death. But they also represent anyone else who feels like they are too good for God. They represent people who think they are better off without him/refuse the invitation.

Meanwhile, Jesus calls us to identify specifically with the king's servants. Jesus tells us that we should see ourselves humbly as servants. We are servants entrusted with wonderful good news, in the form of an invitation from the Lord to those who don't know him.

While some people do reject or ignore God outright, I am convinced that most people stay away from God and Church because that invitation is (i) misrepresented by Church people and (ii) misunderstood by unchurched people.

The invitation becomes all about judgment and guilt, religion and religious rule keeping, dogma and doctrine, arcane rituals/churchy church ceremony. They believe that an invitation to Church is about being "good", being "holy", being "worthy" / They miss the fact that worthiness is predicated wholly and only on their willingness to accept the invitation. And that invitation is to a life changing opportunity for a more joyful life now and rewards to come.

Pope Francis offers his own words of challenge:

"In some people we see an ostentatious preoccupation for the liturgy, for doctrine and for the Church's prestige, but without any concern that the Gospel have a real impact on God's faithful people and the concrete needs of the present time. In this way, the life of the Church turns into a museum piece or something which is the property of a select few...

God save us from a worldly Church with superficial spiritual and pastoral trappings! This stifling worldliness can only be healed by breathing in the pure air of the Holy Spirit who frees us from self-centredness cloaked in an outward religiosity bereft of God. Let us not allow ourselves to be robbed of the Gospel!" (Evangelii Gaudium, 95-97)

We are the people God has chosen to invite and bring people to His table and His Feast — the Eucharist in this life and the Eternal Wedding Banquet in Heaven.

Who is the person thirsting for Christ, the 'paralysed man' waiting to be carried to Christ that you will encounter this week?

Be open to the Holy Spirit pointing out someone to you and then take that risk of inviting them to Mass, or simply to come in and light a candle, or to some other encounter with the Crucified and Risen Christ this week.



What connects Winchester with Louisiana and Africa?

Last Tuesday, Fr Benedict gave a talk about the effects of climate change upon African farmers. We know that developing countries are being hit particularly hard by global warming. This follows years of exploitation by richer nations. Many slaves were taken by British traders from Cameroon to the USA – but we tend to associate large ports such as Bristol and Liverpool with the slave trade.

What about Winchester?

As part of Green Week, Winchester Cathedral organised a walk from East Stratton to the Grange at Northington. The estates around Northington were owned by Sir Francis Baring, founder of Barings Bank. He was a wealthy and influential merchant. Slave labour contributed significantly to the family's fortunes. In 1803 Alexander Baring arranged the financing of the Louisiana Purchase, a massive land acquisition that expanded the United States. The extension of slavery into the deep South followed.

Dr Ibrahima Seck, an academic based in Dakar Senegal who is also director of the Whitney Plantation Slavery Museum, accompanied the walkers. His work focuses on the links between West Africa and Louisiana.

The walk reminded us that we have always been part of an interconnected world and that what happens thousands of miles away impacts upon us here in Hampshire and the UK. We do indeed live in a 'common home'. As Catholics we reflect on our history and stand in solidarity with all our brothers and sisters. Something to think about when you go on a country walk!


