The Shocking Power of the Holy Spirit

Father Mark writes:

As I tap these words out on the screen, I'm preparing for a visit to a Mallorcan monastery, followed by a four hour walk back to the hotel. I'm looking forward to seeing the monastery but I'm much more excited about the hike home. There's something about exploring new hills and valleys, breathing fresh and different air whilst keeping an eye out for interesting flora and fauna, that connects me with the Creator and re-creates me.

It wasn't always thus, however. I have always been blessed with a love of sports but the idea of training or walking when I didn't need to all seemed like a bit of an effort. It's a mini-miracle that I achieved my Chief Scouts Award, especially after my first night hike. It was long, it was cold, we got lost and, unsurprisingly for night time, it was dark! It was the latter which I blamed for my first encounter with an electric fence!

Never one with a high pain threshold - stinging nettles to me were a particularly unnecessary evil - the zap that I got whilst trying to clamber over the fence, unaware that such things existed and could be filled with this menacing power, left a lasting



memory. The shock I received, both physical and metaphorical, was immense.

Power is a valuable commodity. Not only does it keep wandering sheep inside fields, and meandering scouts outside, for the most part at least. It also enables us to do so much that wouldn't be possible by our own human efforts. Think of all the things you do and use every day, from the electric toothbrush to the car and oven and washing machine and smart phone, that simply wouldn't be possible without this superhuman strength. No wonder, then, that oil is so valuable and that now we are rightly looking not just below but also above, to the wind and sun, for renewable sources of energy and power.

What is true for our physical life also holds for our spiritual life. If we try and live the life to which God calls us, if we try and become saints, simply by our human efforts, we are doomed to a life of slavish burden at best and complete failure at worst. We know that we cannot make it to heaven on our own, by our own merits, without grace, without the supernatural help that God offers us. But it is equally true that we cannot live the Christian life on Earth solely by human means. We need God's grace to be at work within us, we need the power of the Holy Spirit, God's

love. We need to be 'touched by', experience in a personal way, 'the finger of God's right hand', the 'power from on high' which Jesus promised to his disciples.

When Jesus spoke and acted it was always with 'power' and 'authority', which made

people wonder who He was. Who is He, that even the wind and the waves obey him? Who is He that He can heal the sick, cast out evil spirits, give sight to the blind, comfort the suffering, give food to the hungry, set captives free?

On the day of Pentecost, which we might call the "big bang" of the Church, when those gathered were filled with the Holy Spirit, there were two accompanying signs: a heavenly sound like a mighty rushing wind and tongues as if of fire.

The Hebrew word for 'spirit' is ruah, which the Greek translates as pneuma. The same word is used to denote 'wind' and 'breath'. We all know the power of 'mighty wind', hurricanes which can pull down trees and cause danger to life. It 'blows where it will' and carries with

it an awesome energy. Windmills and wind turbines can harness this energy and transform it into something which we can use. At the same time, our breath is something totally intimate and yet vital for life.



Similarly, the Holy Spirit has an incredible force which can move hearts and minds and change

the course of history, whilst at the same time possessing an intimacy which can reach down into the most secret part of our selves, bringing healing and life to that which is decaying or rotten. The Holy Spirit is unstoppable power and infinite tenderness.

The sun is an incredibly powerful ball of fire, and we feel it's effects despite it being some 93 million miles away. Its rays bring warmth and light and life. Solar energy has incredible potential to fuel our physical lives. The Holy Spirit is energy from the Son, empowering us with the very life of our almighty, all-powerful God.

Where do we look for the energy we need? Do we look 'below' to our own Human Resources and strength, intelligence and creativity? Or do we look 'above', seeking what we need from the Holy Spirit, the power of the Risen Christ?

Just as Jesus was anointed with the Holy Spirit and with power at his baptism, so too have we been anointed and sealed with the same Holy Spirit and power at our own baptism and confirmation. Just as the body of Jesus was broken on the cross, like an alabaster jar, in order to pour forth the Holy Spirit upon the Church and the world, so too are we called to release the anointing which has been given to us. In such a way, we can at times almost feel this anointing filling our being - reassured of God's loving presence, fears washed away, a new boldness given to us - and then the fragrance becomes a blessing to those whom we encounter and minister.

St. Paul writes to us in this weekend's second reading:

We know, brothers, that God loves you and that you have been chosen, because when we brought the Good News to you, it came to you not only as words, but as power and as the Holy Spirit and as utter conviction.

We need to hear the Good News, the joy of the Gospel again and again and again in our own lives, so that we can be convicted of its truth, strengthened in our faith and



experience anew the power of the Holy Spirit recharging us for the mission of building up the Kingdom of God. It is then, filled with the fire of the Holy Spirit, that we can speak and act in ways that not only make sense to others but further give them that 'electric shock' which, as it did for Thomas when he put his finger into the side of Jesus, dissolves all doubts and fears and enables them and us to proclaim, "My Lord and my God!"

The Pope's new Apostolic Exhortation (a follow up to Laudato Si which was published 8 years ago) is now available in the Parish bookshop. Entitled Laudato Deum, in it he addresses very bluntly our failure to reduce the damage we continue to do to our world, our common home. In an earlier encyclical, Fratelli Tutti, he wrote "our own days seem to be showing signs of a certain regression...Goodness, together with love. Justice and solidarity are not achieved once and for all; they have to be realised each day".

Each of our days are filled with opportunities to consider how we might reduce our harmful impact on nature and contribute to the common good so as to ensure the future of our children and grandchildren.
