Heaven Spent - Give Me Oil in My Lamp, Keep Me Burning

#### **Father Mark writes:**

In our Gospel this weekend we have a powerful parable, told by Jesus about ten 'bridesmaids' waiting for the bridegroom in the dark of night...

"The principal moment of a wedding at this date was when the groom went to fetch the bride from her father's house and took her to his own. The torches should be pictured as oil-soaked rags, flaming on the end of a stick, to usher him either into one house or into the other. (The little oil-lamps found in archaeological excavations would hardly be suitable for such a celebration: they provide minimal light and would blow out in any gust of wind)." (Fr Henry Wansborough OSB)



The problem was, that for the five foolish 'bridesmaids', they had the stick and the rags but <u>no oil</u>. As incredible as it may seem, given my increasingly advanced years, and the number of times I've read and heard this parable, I'd never noticed that detail before. It wasn't just that they didn't bring *enough* oil. It was that they hadn't brought *any* oil at all! It wasn't just that the batteries in their torch were flat, it was that they had a torch without any batteries at all! They really were rather dozy...

In parables, there is often a symbolism to be found in the different characters and elements. In other words, Jesus wasn't really talking about oil, he was meaning something else. But what? Well, there are many different theories, but I think we get a clue from the Sermon on the Mount, and two readings that some couples choose for their wedding:

"Everyone then who hears these words of mine and does them will be like a wise man who built his house on the rock. And the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house, but it did not fall, because it had been founded on the rock. And everyone who hears these words of mine and does not do them will be like a foolish man who built his house on the sand. And the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell, and great was the fall of it."

Here we find the same contrast between wise and foolish. The wise hear the words of Jesus and put them into action, whereas the foolish ones don't.

Again, right at the beginning of the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus says:

"You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven."

This line of interpretation seems to be supported by some of the Church Fathers:

St. Hilary: "The 'oil' is the fruit of good works".

St. Augustine: "But the wise took oil with their lamps,' that is, the gladness of good works..."

St. John Chrysostom: "...the "oil" denotes charity, alms, and every aid rendered to the needy..."

St. Jerome: "The virgins that have oil are they who, besides their faith, have the ornament of good works – they that have not oil, are they that seem to confess with like faith, but neglect the works of virtue..."

Perhaps we might then say that the oil is "good works, prompted by listening to the Word of Jesus and fuelled by the Holy Spirit"? Or, put another way, that through "soaking their rags" in the Word of Jesus and the Holy Spirit, the wise 'bridesmaids' enabled the light of their good works to shine forth.

So, what does this mean for us? There will come a time, at an hour only God knows, when Jesus will come to lead us into the heavenly wedding feast. At that time, will he find our lamps shining brightly with a love and mercy and compassion fuelled by His Word and Holy Spirit?

Last week, I reflected on how St. Paul spent himself in love on the community in Thessalonica, handing over to them not just the Gospel but his whole life. I reflected on how Jesus had handed over his body and blood, spending Himself on us without counting the cost. They could only do this because they had both been fuelled by the Holy Spirit.

What about us? How have we been spending ourselves? In trying to ensure our own fragile luxury and comfort? Or in works of compassion and mercy? Where have we been "soaking our rags"? In the fleeting pleasures of this world or have we allowed ourselves to become "soaked in the Spirit"?

Let me finish with some words of Thomas Merton, the Trappist monk and author:

"We must learn during our lifetime to trim our lamps and fill them with charity in silence. . . if the spirit that kept the flame of physical life burning in our bodies took care to nourish itself with the oil that is found only in the silence of God's charity, then when the body dies, the spirit itself goes on burning with the same oil, its own flame. But if the spirit has burned all along with the base oils of passion or egoism, or pride, then when death comes, the flame of the spirit goes out with the light of the body because there is no more oil in the lamp."

Give me oil in my lamp, Lord, keep me burning! Come, Holy Spirit, come.

## **Stewardship Sunday (18th/19th November)**

Next weekend will be our parish "Stewardship Sunday". Stewardship, simply put, is a recognition of the many gifts with which God has blessed us, and our appropriate response in thanksgiving. People often talk about Stewardship in terms of "time, talents and treasure". It will be an opportunity for me to say thank you to all of you who generously contribute to our parish family and our mission together by the giving of your time, talents and treasure. In particular, I will be focussing on the "treasure" you give to enable us to bring people closer to Jesus in hope and joy and I will be offering an enormous thank you to you all. I will also be inviting you to 'pledge' your giving for next year as part of our worship. There is nothing 'binding' about this but simply an opportunity to symbolically make your regular giving to the parish linked with our offering at Mass and Jesus's offering on the Cross. I know that many of you aren't in a position to give of your 'treasure' at this time, so there will also be the opportunity for you to continue to support us with your prayers and gifts of time and talents. We cannot and must not measure our faith by what we give, but our giving can always be done prayerfully, as an expression of our faith in God and his promises. More next week...




## **Prayer stations for peace**


#### **Winchester Catholic History Society**
