A Message from Fr Mark... Dangerous Prayer II - Begging for the Healing Love of God

Dangerous prayers search your soul, break your habits and change your path. They're the kind of prayers that move mountains, work wonders, expect miracles. We read about a prayer like that in our Gospel this weekend.

As Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the son of Timaeus), a blind beggar, was sitting at the side of the road.

Mark 10:46

A crowd of people were following Jesus. He attracted crowds wherever he went, and they tended to be loud, and chaotic with people vying for Jesus' attention. All the commotion would have likely drowned out a poor man begging on the side of the road. So Bartimaeus, a blind man dependent upon the charity of others, has to shout very loudly. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.'

Mark 10:47

"Son of David" is a title given to the Messiah. Blind Bartimaeus, it seems, is the only one in This sounds like a strange question from this whole crowd, who recognizes Jesus as Lord and king.

Effective prayer first of all does that: it recognizes and acknowledges who God is. Bartimaeus names Jesus as Christ and King, the one with power and authority. And this established the whole context for his prayer and what comes next, which is the most basic of prayers.

"Jesus, Son of David, have pity on me."

Mark 10:47

He begs for mercy, the healing love of God. Then look what happens next: And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all

Mark 10:48

Bartimaeus is *persevering* in prayer. And he doesn't let the apparent lack of an answer, nor the discouraging voice of others, stop him or slow him down. In fact, he cries out "all the more."

Above all, dangerous prayer is persistent prayer, prayer that keeps going despite disappointment and that will not be silenced by resistance or discouragement.

When you meet resistance to prayer and go ahead and do it anyway, you will become better at it, you will become stronger through it, and the prayer will become easier.

Jesus stopped and said, "Call him here."

Mark 10:49a

Amid the chaos and confusion of this scene Jesus hears Bartimaeus. Whenever you are tempted to think that God doesn't hear us, God isn't listening, God has better things to do, remind yourself of Bartimaeus. So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus.

Mark 10:49-50

Dangerous prayer requires something else too, something we don't want to do. It requires

sacrifice, personal sacrifice. We've got to have "skin in the game".

That's what's happening here. Bartimaeus doesn't just come to Jesus, he threw his cloak aside. His cloak was his livelihood. Passers-by would toss coins into it. It was how he collected money.

Tossing it aside meant he was casting aside that day's wages, and risked not eating that day. But he also risked losing his cloak entirely, which could have been a catastrophe for him.

Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?

Mark 10:51a

Jesus. The man is blind and Jesus has the power to heal people. So why does he ask him what he wants? Before we can see God move, it is very important to have clarity for what, specifically, we want.

Dangerous prayers are specific prayers. Jesus asks Bartimaeus what specifically he wants, and Bartimaeus tells him:

"Master, let me see again."

Mark 10:51b

And we know the end of the story. Jesus told him, "Go, your faith has saved you." And immediately his sight returned and he followed him on the way.

Mark 10:52

the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' It's a lovely account but, we might ask, so what...what's it got to do with us? Well, the same Jesus who healed Bartimaeus back in Jericho still heals today. The point of these stories is not just to tell us who Jesus was, but who he is; not just what he did, but what he does. Healing happens. Not everywhere for everyone. But it happened for Bartimaeus back in Jericho that day and it could happen for you right here in Winchester. Our faith tells us that healing happens. It's true, it doesn't happen everywhere for everyone. And that certainly doesn't seem fair. But it doesn't in the least negate the fact that healing happens. Why don't you have a look here...
