FATHER MARK WRITES: GREAT EXPECTATIONS – BECOMING REALISTIC

Over these few weeks, we're exploring a topic that touches all of our lives: expectations. Whether it's expecting a warm greeting from a friend or our meal to turn up in good time at a restaurant, expectations shape how we see the world. But sometimes, they can lead to disappointment or frustration.

The Many Faces of Expectations

Expectations come in all shapes and sizes. Some are simple, like expecting a smile in return when you say hello. Others are more significant, like expecting love and support from our family. We also have practical expectations, such as expecting drivers to stop at red lights. But when our expectations aren't met, especially the ones that matter the most, it can leave us feeling upset.

The Impact of Expectations

Think of expectations as a pair of glasses through which we view our lives. When things go as expected, we feel content. But when they don't, it can lead to feelings of annoyance or anger. For instance, if you expect to receive a certain mark in an exam and don't, it might affect how you feel about yourself or the situation.

Expectations are also mutual. Just as we have expectations for others, they have expectations for us. Understanding and managing these expectations is key to maintaining healthy relationships.

Managing Expectations Wisely

To manage expectations effectively, we need to recognise what we expect and ensure those expectations are realistic. Sometimes, we aren't even aware of our expectations until they're unmet. Identifying these can help us handle them better.

But how do we distinguish between realistic and unrealistic expectations?

The Trap of Unrealistic Expectations

In today's world, we're surrounded by unrealistic expectations. Technology and social media often create a false sense of reality, leading us to expect instant results or perfection. We see idealised images online and feel pressured to measure up, but these expectations are often unattainable and can lead to dissatisfaction. We can also have unrealistic expectations in our relationships and interactions with one another, even the people we think we know best.

Unrealistic expectations can cause us to overlook the blessings we already have, fostering feelings of envy or discontent. We know this, but it's important to remember that what we see online isn't always a true reflection of life.

Setting Realistic Expectations

Here are two ways to ensure our expectations are realistic:

1. Grounded in Reality

Realistic expectations are based on what's true and possible. For example, if a friend is habitually late, it's realistic to expect them to be late the next time. In this week's Gospel, Jesus shares a parable about a manager who wisely navigates his responsibilities by understanding the reality of his situation. Jesus ends the parable by telling us that:

The person who is trustworthy in very small matters is also trustworthy in great ones; and the person who is dishonest in very small matters is also dishonest in great ones. (Luke 16:10)

It's like when you trust someone to take care of a small task at work, and if they do it well, you know you can trust them with more important roles or projects. When setting expectations about a person's future behaviour, the best predictor is their past behaviour. We can learn from this by considering past experiences when setting our expectations.

2. Mutually Agreed Upon

Realistic expectations are also those that are communicated and agreed upon. We often assume others know what we want, but that's not always the case. It's crucial to discuss our expectations with others to ensure everyone is on the same page.

A Lighthearted Lesson: The Biscuit Thief

A woman at an airport bought a packet of biscuits and sat next to a man. As she ate, the man also took a biscuit. She was shocked but said nothing. This continued until one biscuit remained. The man broke it in half and offered her a piece. Annoyed, she later discovered her own packet of biscuits untouched in her bag. She had been eating the man's biscuits all along! This story reminds us of the assumptions we make and the importance of clear communication.

Conclusion

Managing expectations involves understanding what we want and ensuring it's realistic. It's about communicating with others and accepting them for who they are, just as Christ accepts us.

I'd like to invite you this week to take a moment to reflect on any unrealistic expectations you might be holding in your heart and ask God for guidance in letting them go. I'd also like to invite you to consider signing up for, or inviting someone else onto, our Alpha, which starts at the end of the month. It is a wonderful opportunity to explore who God is and to come to dispel any false expectations in our relationship with God and to replace them with much more realistic ones...

For now, simply allow yourself to be reminded:

Your heavenly Father has Great Expectations for us. He expects us to be like him.

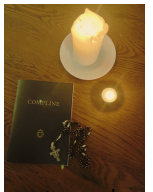

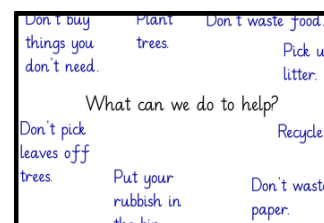

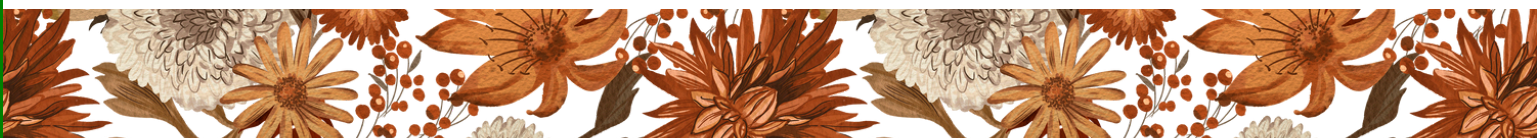
As we celebrate Green Week and remember the relevance of Green Week to Laudato Si, some ideas that we've been thinking about for helping our planet. St Peter's School has a collection box for milk bottle tops (plastic tops from the plastic milk bottles- just those, not any other plastic bottle tops please!) which are taken to be recycled and the funds raised support Kicks Count, a charity aiming to prevent stillbirth. It would be great to have a collection box at St Peter's Church too. Aluminium cans (crushed) and aluminium trays can be recycled in a wheelie bin, clearly marked, outside 36 Lynford Avenue. Tetrapaks can be recycled in the Worthy Lane car park, and (natural, not plastic) corks are taken in by Majestic to be reused. Why not encourage your children, or indeed go out yourself, on a litter pick and see if any of your haul can be recycled?"

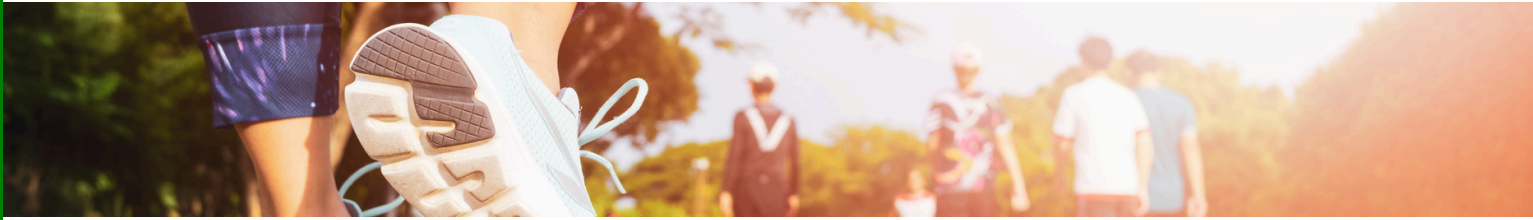
St Peter's Centenary 2026 – A Place for All:

Parish Centenary Pilgrimage Plans 2026

As part of the Parish Centenary celebrations, planning is underway to offer 3 parish Pilgrimages, led by Father Mark, during the Centenary Year. We would like as many people as possible to take part.

1. Camino de Santiago- Ingles route.

Walking the English route from Ferrol to Santiago de Compostela – 119KM/ 75 miles. This will be a 7/8 day trip departing on **Monday 8th June 2026** and returning either Sunday 14th or Monday 15th.

Day 1 Air travel to Santiago De Compostela from London, transfers to Ferroll. Day 2 – 6 walking the Camino Ingles, distances per day vary between 17- 30Km – (11 – 18 miles). The walking is of moderate intensity but a good level of walking fitness will be required to walk these distances every day for 5 days. Accommodation is B&B and dinner in 2/3 star hotels with bag transfer included.

Day 7 – Free day in Santiago de Compostela. Day 8 travel back to London/ Winchester.

Final costs will depend on numbers but anticipated at around £1,100 to include flights, transfers, accommodation in a twin room, breakfast and dinner, bag transfers.

2. Parish pilgrimage to the Catholic National Shrine & Basilica of our Lady of Walsingham, Norfolk ([Catholic National Shrine & Basilica of Our Lady, Walsingham](#))

This 2 day trip will depart early on Monday 10th August and return late on the 11th August.

Day 1 We plan to travel by coach early on Monday morning to Holkham Hall & Estate [Holkham Hall & Estate | Norfolk, England](#) (arriving mid morning) with the rest of the day to enjoy this fabulous Palladian mansion, gardens and parkland. Late afternoon we will travel on the short distance to Walsingham and our accommodation at Elmham House – the Shrine's Pilgrim Hotel, for Mass and supper and a stroll around Walsingham Village and environs.

Day 2 For those able to we will walk the Holy Mile – the last mile of the Pilgrim Way to the site of the Shrine of Our Lady, (coach transfer also available). During the day there will be the opportunity to take part in the daily schedule of worship which includes Sacrament of Reconciliation, The Rosary, Stations of the Cross, Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament and Pilgrim's Mass. We will depart late afternoon for the return journey, stopping en route for a meal before arriving in Winchester circa 9pm. Cost – depending on numbers for transport from Winchester, accommodation, meals (excluding lunch on day 1 and dinner day 2), entry to Holkham Hall and Gardens circa £200.

3. Pilgrimage to Rome & Assisi October 2026

An 8 day visit taking in various locations in Rome, including Mass in St Peter's, a papal audience, and tour of St Peter's. Focus will be on Christian Rome but with opportunities to explore classical Rome. Likely to spend 3/4 days in Rome and 2 full days in Assisi with visits to other sites en route.

Package will include transport from Winchester to London airports, flights accommodation and meals, entry to various locations throughout, transport and a guide. Full itinerary to be confirmed and dates of travel in October 2026 to be agreed once an idea of numbers of interested people is understood.

Indicative costs at this early stage are awaited but likely to be circa £1,500 per person.
